In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

Tradition Eight

"Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional. We define professionalism as the occupation of counseling alcoholics for fees or hire. But we may employ alcoholics where they are going to perform those services for which we might otherwise have to engage non-alcoholics. Such special services may be well recompensed. But our usual A.A. "12th Step" work is never to be paid for. "Throughout the world A.A.s are "12th stepping" with thousands of new prospects a month. Between one and two thousand of these stick on our first presentation; past experience shows that most of the remainder will come back to us later on. Almost entirely unorganized, and completely non-professional, this mighty spiritual current is now flowing from alcoholics who are well to those who are sick. One alcoholic talking to another; that's all. Could this vast and vital face-to-face effort ever be professionalized or even organized? Most emphatically, it could not. The few efforts to professionalize straight "12th Step" work have always failed quickly. Today, no A.A. will tolerate the idea of paid "A.A. Therapists" or "organizers". Nor does any A.A. like to be told just how he must handle that new prospect of his. No, this great life-giving stream can never be dammed up by paid do-gooders or professionals. Alcoholics Anonymous is never going to cut its own life lines. To a man, we are sure of that .But what about those who serve us full time in other capacities--are cooks, caretakers and paid Intergroup secretaries "A.A. professionals"? Because our thinking about these people is still unclear, we often feel and act as though they were such. The impression of professionalism subtly attaches to them, so we frequently hear they are "making money out of A.A.", or that they are "professionalizing" A.A. Seemingly, if they do take our A.A. dollars they don't quite belong with us A.A.s any more. We sometimes go further; we underpay them on the theory they ought to be glad to "cook" for A.A. cheap. Now isn't this carrying our fears of professionalism rather far? If these fears ever got too strong, none but a saint or an incompetent could work for Alcoholics Anonymous. Our supply of saints being quite small, we would certainly wind up with less competent workers than we need. We are beginning to see that our few paid workers are performing only those service tasks that our volunteers cannot consistently handle. Primarily these folks are not doing 12th Step work. They are just making more and better 12th Step work possible. Secretaries at their desks are valuable points of contact, information and public relations. That is what they are paid for, and nothing else. They help carry the good news of A.A. to the outside world and bring our prospects face to face with us. That's not "A.A. therapy"; it's just a lot of very necessary but often thankless work. So, where needed, let's revise our attitude toward those who labor at our special services. Let us treat them as A.A. associates, and not as hired help; let's recompense them fairly and, above all, let's absolve them from the label of professionalism. Let us also distinguish clearly between "organizing the A.A. movement" and setting up, in a reasonably business-like manner, its few essential services of contact and propagation. Once we do that, all will be well. The million or so brother alcoholics who are still sick will then continue to get the break we 60,000 A.A.s have already had. Let's give our "service desks" the hand they so well deserve. -- Bill W.

Service Concept Eight:

"The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of over-all policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities."

Concept VIII – The General Service Board Acts in Larger Matters of Policy and Finance, and Has Custodial Oversight of the A.A. Corporations.

Having introduced and discussed relationships between the General Service Conference and the General Service Board in Concepts Six and Seven, Bill goes on to discuss matters of practical operations of A.A.'s world services in Concept Eight. Here he introduces two other components of the A.A. world service structure, the corporations. Incorporated legally under the laws of the State of New York, the world service structure includes Alcoholics Anonymous World Services, Inc. (AAWS) and The Grapevine, Inc. These corporate entities carry out day-to-day world service operations and activities.

AAWS is often referred to as the "publishing arm" of A.A., and is charged with developing, publishing and distributing our literature, books and pamphlets, as well as other operations of the Fellowship including communications with our members and groups. The Grapevine, Inc. produces, publishes and distributes the A.A. Grapevine, often referred to as "our meeting in print".

As Bill points out, the Board (Trustees) devotes itself to larger and critical matters of policy, finance, group relations, public relations and leadership. The Trustees are expected to skillfully manage, plan and execute. They must not be burdened with the endless questions and difficulties that arise daily, weekly and monthly in the routine conduct of world service affairs. The corporate entities were created in order to do this. Each of the corporations has its own charter, its own corporate directors, its own working capital, its own executive, its own employees, and its own office and equipment. The two corporations carry out their assigned functions, duties and responsibilities independently, but with Board oversight. The Board serves as a "holding company", charged only with custodial oversight of the two corporate entities. Board involvement is usually limited to such matters as mediating difficult situations and assuring that the separate corporations operate within their budget and within the general framework of A.A. and its headquarters policy. In modern parlance, it might be said that the Board oversees but does not "micro-manage".

Bill says that this corporate structure is in line with modern business practice, and has demonstrated that it is superior to any other method of operation. Having many committees or departments of the Board trying to carry out the needed day-to-day work, for example, would be very cumbersome and ineffective.

Finally, in Concept Eight, Bill argues that two corporations (AAWS and The Grapevine) are necessary because of the differences in their purposes and activities. Placing all the needed activities under one corporation would create executive difficulties, require too many executive talents in one person, and overconcentrate executive authority. Bill's wisdom was proven once again when a recent proposal to combine the two corporations in order to save money and create efficiency did not receive Conference approval.



The Grapevine Timeline



June 1944 The first issue of the Grapevine is published by six New York AA members, with the blessing of Bill W. A copy is sent to every AA group (about 300) and to all known AAs in the armed forces overseas. The price: 15 cents per copy. April 1945 A questionnaire for AA members published in the Grapevine and responses from hundreds of AAs provides the basis for E.M. Jellinek's famous phases of Alcohol Addition chart. **December 1945** With the approval of the groups, the Grapevine is designated "the national journal of Alcoholics Anonymous. "April 1946 Publication of Bill W.'s "Twelve Suggested Points for AA Tradition" lays the framework for the Twelve Traditions. June 1947 The AA Preamble, written by the first editor of the Grapevine, makes its debut. **September 1948** The magazine gets a new look and size. (See above, this page.) January 1949 Readership expands to Canada and Europe; Grapevine becomes "the international journal of Alcoholics Anonymous. "July 1950 The Grapevine covers the First international convention of AA in Cleveland, Ohio. December 1950 Bill W. and

Dr. Bob propose a General Service Conference in the article "Your Third Legacy. "January 1951. A memorial issue for Dr.Bob is published. **December 1955** "Came to Believe. . ." (now known as "The Man on the Bed"). created for the Grapevine, is reproduced in full color in the issue. September 1956 The Slogans start to appear for the first time in their hand-lettered form, each accompanied by an article. July 1957 the price of a copy of the Grapevine is raised from 25 cents to 35 cents.1960 The Grapevine celebrates the 25th anniversary of AA with the book AA Today, containing articles by Aldous Huxley. Reinhold Niebuhr and other distinguished AA supporters. July 1962 Grapevine editor Jack M. creates Victor E., now an AA icon. January 1963 Bill W.'s correspondence with Dr. Carl Jung is published. 1965 The Responsibility Declaration is written for the 1965 International Convention in Toronto by a former Grapevine editor, Bill W. writers about it in July 1965, and it soon becomes a regular feature. July 1967 The Serenity Prayer becomes a regular part of the Grapevine format. March 1971 An issue in memory of AA's co-founder, Bill W., is published. February 1978 The magazine presents Bill W.'s correspondence with Yale University, in which he turned down an honorary degree. March 1978 Grapevine circulation reaches 100,000. 1984 Publication of The Best of Bill, a collection of five of Bill's essays on faith, fear, honesty, humility, and love, explaining how he applied the principles of AA. 1986 The General Service Conference recognizes the Grapevine as the international journal of Alcoholics Anonymous. June 1987 The magazine's first full-color cover appears. 1988 All the articles Bill W. wrote for the Grapevine are collected and published in The Language of the Heart. September 1991 The magazine begins publishing an article in Spanish in every issue. June 1994 The Grapevine celebrates its 50th Anniversary Issue with a new design and a full-color cover. **July 1996** The first issue of La Vina, a bimonthly publication for Spanish-speaking members of AA, is published by the Grapevine. 1997-1998 Grapevine website, aagrapevine.org, is born. January 2000 The Millennium Issue is published. 2000 i-Say, the Grapevine's online bulletin board, makes its debut. 2002 The GrapeNet, an online bulletin board for registered GvRs, is introduced. July 2003 The Grapevine's first thread-sewn "prison issue" is published in response to the need for staple-free material in the federal corrections system. June 2004 The Grapevine Digital Archive is launched, making almost every Grapevine article and letter ever published accessible on the website. April 2007 "At Wit's End," suggested by Grapevine readers, becomes the successor to "Ham on Wry" as the title of the humor pages. October 2007 After the 57th General Service Conference recommends that "the Grapevine and La Vina include a section on the medical, legal and social aspects of alcoholism," "Alcoholism at Large" makes its debut. March 2009 The Grapevine is redesigned; the magazine is now full-color and staple-free.


