GENERAL WARRANTIES OF THE NORTHERN NEVADA INTERGROUP ASSOCIATION OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

Bill W. On the Second Tradition

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority--a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience.--Long form of Tradition Two Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions

Sooner or later, every AA comes to depend upon a Power greater than himself. He finds that the God of his understanding is not only a source of strength, but also a source of *positive direction*. Realizing that some fraction of that infinite resource is now available, his life takes on an entirely different complexion. He experiences a new inner security together with such a sense of destiny and purpose as he has never known before. As each day passes, our AA reviews his mistakes and vicissitudes. He learns from daily experience what his remaining character defects are and becomes ever more willing that they be removed. In this fashion he improves his conscious contact with God.

Every AA group follows this same cycle of development. We are coming to realize that each group, as well as each individual, is a special entity, not quite like any other. Though AA groups are basically the same, each group does have its own special atmosphere, its own peculiar state of development. We believe that every AA group has a conscience. It is the collective conscience of its own membership. Daily experience informs and instructs this conscience. The group begins to recognize its own defects of character and, one by one, these are removed or lessened. As this process continues, the group becomes better able to receive right direction for its own affairs. Trial and error produces group experience, and out of corrected experience comes custom. When a customary way of doing things is definitely proved to be best, then that custom forms into AA Tradition. The Greater Power is then working through a clear group conscience.

We humbly hope and believe that our growing AA Tradition will prove to be the will of God for us.

Many people are coming to think that Alcoholics Anonymous is, to some extent, a new form of human society. In our discussion of the First Tradition, it was emphasized that we have, in AA, no coercive human authority. Because each AA, of necessity, has a sensitive and responsive conscience, and because alcohol will discipline him severely if he backslides, we are finding we have little need for manmade rules or regulations. Despite the fact that we do veer off at times on tangents, we are becoming more able to depend absolutely on the long-term stability of the AA group itself. With respect to its own affairs, the collective conscience of the group will, given time, almost surely demonstrate its perfect dependability. The group conscience will, in the end, prove a far more infallible guide for group affairs than the decision of any individual member, however good or wise he may be. This is a striking and almost unbelievable fact about Alcoholics Anonymous. Hence we can safely dispense with those exhortations and punishments seemingly so necessary to other societies. And we need not depend overmuch on inspired leaders. Because our active leadership of service can be truly rotating, we enjoy a kind of democracy rarely possible elsewhere. In this respect we may be, to a large degree, unique.

Therefore we of Alcoholics Anonymous are certain that there is but one ultimate authority, "a loving God as he may express himself in our group conscience."

Legacies

Service Concept Two:

The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs."

Concept II – The A.A. General Service Conference, through Our Delegates, Serves as both the Voice and the Effective Conscience for All of A.A.

In its first twenty years, authority and responsibility for the conduct of A.A.'s affairs lay with its co-founders, Bill and Dr. Bob. At the 1955 20th Anniversary Convention in St. Louis, this was turned over to the A.A. groups worldwide. Seeing, however, that it would not be practical to expect the thousands of groups and many thousands of members to directly manage and conduct these affairs, some method of group representation was needed. After some years of operating on a trial basis, A.A.'s General Service Conference was confirmed in order to do this. The Conference became official through adoption of its Charter at the 1955 convention.

On first reading the Concepts, I had no idea what a charter is. Eventually I found that it is a document that outlines the principal functions and purposes of an organization; or, in the case of A.A., our Fellowship. As Bill states in his writing of Concept II, the Charter establishes The General Service Conference as "... the actual voice and the effective conscience or our whole society." The Conference votes on matters for us, but does so only after receiving and considering the views, ideas and opinions of local A.A. groups through our elected Conference Delegates. By this means, local groups are the essential owners of our Fellowship.

The once-a-year Conference meeting is made up of 93 Delegates from geographic areas of the U.S. and Canada. It also includes members of our General Service Board, the Directors of our two corporations, Alcoholics Anonymous World Services, Inc. and the Grapevine, Inc., and staff of our General Service Office and Grapevine. Approximately 135 Conference members give their time and energy to represent us and serve as the A.A. group conscience.

Until his passing in 1971, Bill continued to serve in an advisory capacity particularly to the headquarters operation, now known as our General Service Office. The GSO is charged with carrying out A.A.'s day-to-day operations. When I think of the General Service Office I think of it as making 12th Step work possible on a world-wide level. In his writing of Concept II, Bill's thinking led him to make a distinction between *ultimate* and *immediate* service authority. The 12 Concepts were written to help clarify this distinction as well as its practical implications. General Service Board members, referred to as our Trustees, include both alcoholic and non-alcoholic professionals. The Board, serving as A.A.'s legal foundation, is given a large share of active and immediate responsibility for world service affairs. But, "...the final say--the ultimate sanction in matters of large importance--has not been given to the Trustees alone." Rather, the General Services Charter gives this ultimate and broader responsibility and authority to the A.A. groups themselves, made operational through our method and process of delegate representation.

How has this worked out? My experience leads me to think that the primary basis of its success over a period of 50 years is that we are all committed to working together to serve the common good of all of A.A., and to support each other in maintaining our own personal sobriety while carrying the A.A. message to others.





FROM JAIL TO FREEDOM



I don't know how or when I became an alcoholic. I

remember the first time I got drunk was 12 and that's not a normal experience for a 12 year old. I threw up and passed out and when I woke the next morning all I wanted to do was get drunk again so maybe that was when I became alcoholic. One thing for sure is I knew what and how alcohol made me feel and at 14 I started drinking on weekends and by 15 I found other stuff. At age 16 I was drunk or high on something every day. My life became utter chaos. I started getting in trouble with the law. I didn't care about school or my future. The only thing that mattered was my drinking. I turned 18 in a California Youth Authority camp. I've been shot five times on three separate occasions. I've rolled three vehicles and had two head on accidents. I've crashed a motorcycle running from police in Oakland, CA. I've been in every jail from Santa Cruz to Reno. I've never held a job. I've never been married and I've never had children. I hated everyone and everything on this earth. I blamed everyone for my problems and at one time I didn't speak to my parents for 9 years. I was always against any idea of a God until the end of my drinking when I figured there must be a God and I'm only here for his or its amusement. I was being punished by some God. I started with suicide attempts which only lead to emergency room visits and stays in mental hospitals. In January 2016 I was sent to the mental hospital for the third time in two years but this time something different happened. H&I came into the mental hospital in Roseville, CA. It was one man who told his story and for the first time in my life I listened for similarities between his story and how I've been living. I've been in and out of AA since 1987 and always thought people were full of themselves. This time I heard the speaker. The next week three men came in and I was eager to hear them. I knew AA was where I should go when I get out this time. I was totally broke and starving and I would sit at AA meetings all day listening to stories and

hoping someone would bring in doughnuts or something. I was still smoking pot and I didn't have a sponsor and nothing was changing. I still wanted to die every day. One morning I walked into a meeting and just broke down crying. One man named Sam got two other men and they took me across the street to a deli and got me something to eat and a coke. They all shared what they went through. I really liked what Sam said and the next day I asked if he would sponsor me. We started reading the book of Alcoholics Anonymous together. I stopped smoking pot and started working the steps. I learned that I'm different from other people. I learned that I had physical maladies as well as mental and spiritual maladies. I learned that I have a mental obsession coupled with a physical allergy and no matter what great idea I have to control my drinking if I take that first drink I will develop a craving that I will never satisfy. The biggest thing and what I think is the most important of my sobriety is I learned how to start to find a God. My own God. I started to pray. That's right. I hated God or anything to do with God but I was willing to do anything Sam asked of me and what did I have to lose at this point anyway. Next I learned that I built resentments against people and that I was selfish and self-centered, that I was driven by fear and I made most of my decisions based on my self-centered fear. I wrote all this stuff down on paper and Sam helped me see my part in everything. I shared my deepest darkest secrets with Sam. I told him stuff that I swore I would take to my grave. I learned what character defects I had and then I really started getting direction on how to pray and my relationship with my higher power started to grow and strengthen. I've hurt so many people and Sam kept meeting and taking me through the book and the steps and I made amends to people I hurt. A lot of the people I hurt where people who loved me so much and I hurt them so bad by living the way I did. I have fallen in love with AA. I go to meetings every day and I now have a design for living life to its fullest. I'm in service. I have a home group. I have friends. I help new people who are just the way I was when Sam found me. I'm a good son and a good employee and a good brother to my siblings. Someday maybe I'll be a good husband. AA has saved my life and change the way I look at the world. I could never give back what AA has given me. Thank you AA. C.S. Reno, NV


