It's More than an apology

Although saying "I'm Sorry" might be part of the process, making amends is not actually about an apology. In the eighth step, members of twelve-step programs make lists of all those individuals they directly harmed while in active addiction, spending time thinking about those individuals and the wrongs committed against them. When it comes time to make amends for those wrongdoings, the goal is to not just apologize but to restore order by actually righting the wrong. By nature, an apology only expresses guilt and regret, but does little in the way of restitution; in fact, a mere apology could even make matters worse. Instead, making amends is about fixing what has been broken, admitting one's wrongs honestly, making restitution, repaying debts, or suffering the unpaid consequences of actions. There's a degree of responsibility involved in the ninth step as the individual making amends has progressed to a point where he or she recognized the injustices caused to others and *wants* to restore balance. When fulfilling the ninth step, it's been said that the easiest amends to make are those that are financial in nature, such as money that was borrowed without being repaid or valuables that were outright stolen. The most difficult amends to make often involves repairing relationships, especially in cases where trust has been broken and individuals' feelings have been severely hurt. Over the course of the ninth step, it's important to remember that the ultimate goal is to promote healing while restoring balance and order.

"Good service leaders, together with sound and appropriate methods of choosing them, are at all levels indispensable for our future functioning and safety. The primary world service leadership once exercised by the founders of A.A. must necessarily be assumed by the Trustees of the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous."

Concept IX – The Need for Good Leadership Throughout A.A.

Bill begins his discussion of Concept Nine by saying that the success of any service structure always depends on the quality of persons available to carry out the jobs that need to be done. In A.A., this starts at the group level with the selection of its General Service Representative, and extends with increasing importance through to District Committee Members, Area Committee persons, Conference Delegates, and Members of the General Service Board. A.A.'s long term success depends on the selection of the best persons available at each job level.

Discussion of qualities of good leadership is central to Concept IX. Bill begins this discussion by setting up two opposite and extreme situations. Putting "principles before personalities", carried to an extreme, would set up a rather faceless group of automatons trying to please everybody. At the other end would be leaders who are "...people of the most sterling judgment, morals, and inspirations; big doers, prime examples to all, and practically infallible." Real leadership falls somewhere between these two extremes, being neither faceless and without personality differences, nor perfect.

Here are some bullet points drawn selectively from Bill's discussion of good leaders in A.A.

- They lead by example; they do not drive by mandate.
- They originate plans, policies and ideas for innovation while also consulting widely with others.
- They are neither over-bearing "power-drivers" nor meek "order takers".
- They never pass the buck, but take effective action within the framework of their defined authority and responsibility.
- They recognize that even prideful and angry people can be right while the humble may be quite mistaken.
- They listen carefully to their critics and others who disagree with them.
- They respect the quality of "give and take", being willing to compromise cheerfully.

Bill continues to discuss *vision* as another attribute of leadership. By vision, he means "...the ability to make good estimates, both for the immediate and more distant future. Tolerance, responsibility and flexibility are other leadership attributes are needed along with vision.

Every leader does have all the needed skills and experiences. Talents vary greatly among our members. Because of this, it is important to have sound methods for selecting leaders. At many levels of A.A., leaders are selected by what is called the "Third Legacy" method, which means selecting persons who either receive a two-thirds majority in a voting process or, in the case of no one receiving this majority, by lot (drawing names from a hat). Over the years, this has proven to be a most successful A.A. leader selection method. People with good combinations of skills and talents as well as good leadership attributes always seem to emerge from this procedure.

My name is Ronda and I am an alcoholic. I am the Central Office Manager for Northern Nevada Intergroup of Alcoholics Anonymous. We are doing this interview to document what went on at the office during the Covid-19 (of 2020) pandemic with the meetings and with the office. I have a list of questions in front of me and I'm going to try to answer them the best I can.

When did the Central Office start learning about meetings closing down? I would have to say that was right after our St Patty's Day event which was March 18th, I believe. The first meeting that said they had to close down was the Southside meeting. They actually came in and said that they were going to have to close down. They are a rather large meeting right now before Covid. Then after that we started getting phone calls here and there and then of course the governor had us close down. At that point it was basically the Triangle had to close down and then it just fell like dominoes where every single meeting just closed. And that's just how it was.

Right away the Fellowship started putting up Zoom meetings and we were able to put them up on the NNIG website which was really good. Actually, everything closed down but the Alano in Sparks was a little bit rebellious and they tried to stay open for as long as they could. They did stay open for about a week or a week and a half and meetings were still open there. I did go to meetings there because there were no meetings anywhere. A lot of people were full of fear at that time. I had been taught that we needed meetings to stay sober and all of a sudden we didn't have any meetings anymore, so I was trying to keep that going for myself and my own sobriety as much as possible. Of course when people would call, I would tell them that the Alano was still open. There was quite a bit of transition from going to in-person meetings to Zoom meetings but it was done because we alcoholics will do what we need to do to stay sober just like we did what we needed to do to drink.

How did the central office begin the process of virtual meetings? It really was The Fellowship. The very first meeting that came online actually might have been the Truckee River Men's Stag meeting. They started it and opened up a meeting every night at 7:00. It was a little bit unclear if it was men's only or if it was going to be open but apparently it was men's only but not too long after, that day or maybe a day or so later, other meetings started saying, "Here can you put this on the website," and that's what we started to do. It was quite a scramble to let the fellowship know that, "Yes all the meetings have stopped, but we now have virtual meetings." Our phones were very busy at the office at that point for current members and also for future members that were calling about getting their papers signed and wondering what to do. We really had no answers for them. We told them they needed to talk to whoever their judge or their attorney or whoever needed them to go to meetings.

Along with online meetings the other problem that came up was anonymity. So there were a lot of people who wouldn't go to zoom meetings because of that. At that time, as far as I know, with the meetings that have been on Zoom there were a lot of breaks with people. There were a lot of Zoom bombings with a lot of things that were meant to be insulting or vulgar that were put on the Zoom meetings. That was upsetting to a lot of people and that was something that had to get worked out which I think it has for the most part now. Another thing that came about with the online meetings and because of the zoom bombing was that people didn't want their meeting on the website anymore, which I personally took, but it wasn't personal to me. At that point the only way that we had for a newcomer to go to a meeting was to go to a zoom meeting so I wanted to make sure that there were as many Zoom meetings as possible for the newcomer to go to and with some meetings being taken off it was a little hurtful. I had to work out my own personal feelings on that about accepting that every group is autonomous and that they can do whatever they need to do. So I did work that out which was good and we had a string of meetings for newcomers and old-timers and in-between'ers.

Did the General Service Office provide information? We did get a little bit of information from the General Service Office. The General Service Office was hit hard because at that time New York was worse than any part of the country. So they were working from home and they were trying to scramble to get their own office in order. We did eventually start getting a few updates from them which at that point we kind of basically had figured it out for ourselves. That's not being sarcastic it's just being, "that's just how it was." It's basically "here's the problem let's figure it out" and the fellowship did well in the Reno-Sparks Carson, the whole area did really good with that. How did Covid-19 effect the Central Office? We kept the office running just as normally as we could. On that standpoint I made sure there were always books available. It did come up whether to close the office or not and it came down to that the office needed to be open because the newcomer and even someone who was already in the fellowship might have a problem and needed a place to go or to get a book or to get a cup of coffee. We've never been at the point in the office where we have had to close the door because there were too many people in the office or not. We have always been open, the phones have always been answered, the door has always been open during business hours for someone to come in and people did come in. People did come in especially in the beginning because it was pretty scary for everybody.

Another way that the office has been affected is somewhat financially. Because the Fellowship is so giving and it's really so loving, they wanted to make sure that the office was open we have had individual contributions and they have made up for the lack of group contributions. I know that groups were sitting on money and they decided to give it to the office. We've never been really worried about the financial aspect of it and maybe that's from the 9th Step Promises. I've seen that from my own personal life and that's the way it's supposed to be.

Oh and elections! We just had elections. We had to postpone them. Actually, in our bylaws it says that we are supposed to do elections in June. We did not do them in June, we did them in July this year because of Covid-19. Just like everything else we need to try to have some kind of normalcy to anything we do in life with some adjustments and we didn't do it. It was a hybrid meeting. There were about 10 of us that went to the Alano Club and I believe 23 were online. Because of rotation and two-year limit we did lose quite a few people for committees and on the steering committee but we were able to get a steering committee quorum going for that. We got someone to step up for Treasurer afterwards. Most of the committee members for the different commitments (like Events) we don't have a chair for Events, but we have no events going on so it's okay. We did have someone step up to be Corrections but they're not a whole lot of Corrections going on. The Institutions, the Rehab Center Chair had to step down but he's willing to fill any commitments needed, to make sure those are taken care of, which he did when someone called about the West Hills meetings. So just like everything, it'll be worked out. I totally believe that. I trust that because it always has. It was definitely different (the election) but it was held and it went on and we are now moving forward one day at a time.

Will virtual meetings continue? I think they will. There have always been online meetings and some of them will continue. There are some people who, for one reason or another, cannot make it to regular meetings so they will continue. I don't know about in this actual area.

What are your thoughts about Reno- Sparks AA having met the needs of the newcomer during this is? The Fellowship has been awesome during this. Once this happened and the in-person meetings stopped going on, we switched to a different strategy here at the office. If somebody called and they were a newcomer but they weren't necessarily asking for help or they were asking for meetings and we found out that they were a newcomer, we would ask them how they would feel about somebody calling them from the Fellowship. All of them said they would love it so we switched from just giving them meeting information and how meetings worked to actually having a connection with another member and that way they could have phone numbers. That's something we might still continue to do even now that meetings are opening up. We're still doing that so that way they have the connection.

This has changed so much and I think in the beginning we thought it wouldn't last that long but this is turning out to be affecting the whole year probably. All the events have been cancelled. That's for everything, not specifically for NNIG. So it'll be interesting to see how this turns out. I do think a lot of meetings will close and not reopen. I think we'll lose a lot of meetings but I think we might gain new meetings. Who's to say what's going to happen. We'll wait and see what happens.
