In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

What We Were Like

Fragments of AA History - The AA Preamble

The words contained in the AA Preamble are perhaps the most often repeated words throughout the AA Fellowship. Used to open many meetings around the world, the Preamble encapsulates the essence of AA's Traditions and gives an overview of the practices and principles so vital to AA life.

Yet, where did these words come from? Who wrote them, and why?

Following the first major surge of AA membership in the early 1940s, due in part to the Jack Alexander article about AA in the *Saturday Evening Post* and subsequent media stories about AA, there was an increasing and widespread interest in AA, both among potential candidates for the Fellowship and among those nonalcoholic family members, friends, and professionals who dealt with alcoholics in their daily lives. With the hope of providing a concise definition of AA for such interested people, the June 1947 Grapevine carried the original version of what is now known throughout the AA world as the Preamble. It was written by Tom Y., the Grapevine's first editor, who borrowed heavily for the phrasing on the following paragraph in

Grapevine's first editor, who borrowed neavily for the phrasing on the following paragraph in the Foreword to the first edition of Alcoholics Anonymous:

"We are not an organization in the conventional sense of the word. There are no dues or fees whatsoever. The only requirement for membership is an honest desire to stop drinking. We are not allied with any particular faith, sect or denomination, nor do we oppose anyone. We simply wish to be helpful to those who are afflicted."

The Preamble, initially referred to as "the AA Definition," took its place thereafter in each monthly issue of the Grapevine, and soon began to appear in Conference-approved literature and many other AA publications.

The phraseology from the Big Book regarding "an *honest* desire to stop drinking" as "the only requirement for membership" was carried over into the original wording of the Preamble. However, at the 1958 General Service Conference, a delegate asked about the words "honest desire to stop drinking," suggesting that since "honest" does not appear in the Third Tradition, it might be deleted from the Preamble. In discussion, most Conference members felt that as AA had matured, it had become almost impossible to determine what constitutes an honest desire to stop drinking, and also that some who might be interested in the program could be confused by that phrase. Who was to determine what was an "honest desire" anyway? Thus, as a part of the evolution of AA, the phrase had been dropped from common usage. The mid-summer meeting of the AA General Service Board ratified the deletion, and since then the Preamble has read simply "a desire to stop drinking."

At the same time, the phrase "AA has no dues or fees" was clarified to read as it presently does: "There are no dues or fees for AA membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions."

Over the years, as the Preamble caught on within the Fellowship and with nonalcoholic friends of AA, it has been translated into many other languages--Russian and Danish being the most recent. In addition, the Preamble has been used in television and radio public service announcements, has been adapted (subject to copyright approval) by many other "twelve step fellowships" as a concise definition of who and what *they* are. It has also been cited in many research papers, self-help books, master's theses, and has appeared in the occasional doctoral dissertation.

Such is the brief history of the AA Preamble--this shining beacon which draws so many sick and suffering alcoholics into its light. And no matter where the Preamble may end up, it will always be best known as the beginning of yet another meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous.

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Concept III

As a traditional means of creating and maintaining a clearly defined working relation between the groups, the Conference, the A.A. General Service Board and its several service corporations, staffs, committees and executives, and of thus insuring their effective leadership, it is here suggested that we endow each of these elements of world service with a traditional "Right of Decision."

You should be familiar with the Conference Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board as background for this Concept, both of which are found in The A.A. Service Manual. For, except for the specific directions in these documents, every trusted servant and every A.A. entity — at all levels of service — has the right "to decide . . . how they will interpret and apply their own authority and responsibility to each particular problem or situation as it arises." That is, they can "decide which problems they will dispose of themselves and upon which matters they will report, consult, or ask specific directions." This is "the essence of 'The Right of Decision.'" But this right also means the Fellowship must have trust in its "trusted servants." If the groups instruct their G.S.R.s rather than giving them a "Right of Decision," then the area conference is hamstrung. If the G.S.R.s instruct the area delegates rather than giving them a "Right of Decision," then the General Service Conference is hamstrung. As Bill points out, "our Conference delegates are primarily the servants of A.A. as they should . . . cast their votes . . . according to the best dictates of their own judgment and conscience at that time."



Similarly, if the General Service Board, acting through its subsidiary boards, "were to attempt to manage" the General Service Office and the AA Grapevine "in detail, then . . . the staff members . . . would quickly become demoralized; they would be turned into buck-passers and rubber stamps; their choice would be to rebel and resign, or to submit and rot." Bill warns against using "The Right of Decision" as an excuse for failure to make the proper reports of actions taken; or for exceeding a clearly defined authority; or for failing to consult the proper people before making an important decision. But he concludes: "Our entire A.A. program rests squarely upon the principle of mutual trust. We trust God, we trust A.A., and we trust each other."








The Driars Club, Triangle Club, Alano Club and Alano Club in Carson City are open and available for meetings.



My belief - Your belief

A member shares about his own spiritual journey in AA and says we all need time to find our place

When I was a newcomer, some people were very aggressive in attempting to tell me that my Christian understanding of a Higher Power was a problem. They said I had to abandon my beliefs to accept "AA's concept."

To this day, I don't know what they meant. But this made my initial journey into the program, and the question of God, more problematic and challenging for me than it needed to be. I wondered for a long time if I could still be a Christian and be a part of this AA thing. I have also heard people hammering newcomers with a very specific concept of God, a very Christiansounding version, insisting that newcomers had to believe in a particular concept of God to be a part of the program.

I learned from my sponsor that my beliefs about God weren't a problem. He helped me through those vulnerable and troubling first months of sobriety. He struggled intensely with his own concept of God and he openly shared those struggles with me. He was an atheist at the time he worked with me, while I was a Christian with a strong faith.

My faith alone, however, was not able to keep me sober. I needed AA. I never tried to convert my sponsor and he never tried to convert me. He took me through the Big Book. I was desperate to hear what he and the Big Book had to say. We bonded over that mutual connection that the disease of alcoholism creates in us. For me, my faith and understanding of a Higher Power was strengthened, as was my faith in AA and in the Twelve Steps. His work with me has helped my own program of sobriety give fruition to the Promises presented in the Ninth Step.

I can't say what happened for him on the God-front but he always shared with me how much he valued our time together. We are good friends to this day. I got to give him his seven-year sobriety chip soon after he had to disconnect his brother from life support. His brother was an alcoholic who was unable to get the message of AA.

I sponsored a lot of guys. Of those guys, the only one who is still sober, to my knowledge, was an atheist when I started working with him. He was still an atheist when he moved away from Sacramento and got a new sponsor. We struggled with the Third Step. I let him explore his reactions to the concepts presented in the Big Book. I didn't try to convert him. I listened to what he had to say, just as my sponsor listened to me.

I don't know where my old sponsee stands on God now, but I have watched the Ninth Step Promises come into his life. He participates in service work and helps others to get sober and stay sober.

To this day, I believe my experience with my sponsor, and my only sober sponsee, send an important message about this very contentious issue of spirituality in the program. I believe that it is of paramount importance to honor and give space for the process that each person must engage in to work through the issue of faith and a Higher Power in AA. To me, a critical aspect of the program is presented in the words, "God, as we understand Him."

The program presents us with a question and then leaves a nurturing space for us to examine and investigate the question. I believe that it's more important for our sobriety and for our relationship with a Higher Power to sincerely examine and explore the question and the concept of God than it is to come to any particular answer.

As a faithful Christian, I'm not threatened by other conceptions of God, nor do I think a person's program of sobriety is compromised by a different understanding of God than mine, even if it's simply a "Group Of Drunks" or "Good Orderly Direction." As my understanding of the program teaches me, I judge a person by their works. If someone is working with others, carrying the message and reaching out to newcomers, I see an understanding of God that works.

I've met people all across the spectrum on the God issue. These are people who have overcome many challenges in their own lives and yet have made a potent impact in the lives of others. I have witnessed the Ninth Step Promises come to fruition for individuals representing all dimensions on the spectrum of faith. I have to believe what my experience tells me, that the founders of AA were wise to include "as we understood Him," in the Third and Eleventh Steps. Protocol for virtual meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous

Throughout the last year some things have changed in the way meetings are held. With that change comes growing pains. We may have let the traditions slip by us. Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of our recovery and we must do what we can to protect that. Although many of you that host meetings might already be aware of the suggested settings. It is a good idea to have them posted and accessible. The following are some suggestions that came from the San Francisco and Marin Intergroup for Zoom A.A. meetings: *Go to: Settings > Recording and click off the Local and Cloud recording features.

In the Zoom Settings section, under the Meeting subtab:

- Require Encryption for Third Party Endpoints
- Disable Auto saving chats
- Disable File transfer
- Disable Feedback to Zoom
- Disable Screen sharing
- Disable desktop/screen share for users
- Disable Remote control

 Allow Virtual background (this is the Zoom default and allows the user to use a virtual background instead of the inside of their apartment, for example)

- In the Zoom Settings section, under the Recording subtab:
- Disable Local recording
- Disable Cloud recording
- Disable Automatic recording

These are ways to protect and practice A.A.'s tradition of anonymity. There are many other great suggestions from our friends at https://aasfmarin.org.

malicious disruptions and the dreaded Zoom Bomber is:


Having a co-Host there specifically to handle any disruptive participants -this is one of the best ways to handle bombers

Do not allow screen sharing

There is no way of completely getting rid of these delinquents but there are ways to make it harder for the disruptions to happen.

As our A.A. community keeps changing so do the meetings. The **nnig.org** website will only publish meetings that are accessible to anyone that has a desire to stop drinking. (Tradition 3) If there is a meeting that is not it will be removed. Each group is autonomous and therefore no one can tell a group that they must have their meeting accessible to everyone (Tradition 4). Northern Nevada Intergroup is the direct servant of the groups. Northern Nevada Intergroup will always carry the message of Alcoholics Anonymous in accordance with the 12 Steps, 12 Traditions and the 12 Concepts.
