
In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

Letting go

When a defect arises, she tries to release it like a balloon and let it float up to the sky. It feels so much lighter when it's gone

For a long time I thought Step Six meant doing nothing, just waiting around and being ready. I wondered why it had to be a separate Step. Why not just go ahead to Step Seven and ask?

But one day, during my morning meditation, I was plagued by one of my defects and realized there is an action to take in Step Six. Being entirely ready means letting go. That's my part. Right in the middle of a bad thought or attitude or action—if I recognize it—I can stop it right then, without completing it, without giving myself that satisfaction. And I might have to do this over and over. I might have to because certain defects are, in some strange way, comfortable, familiar, even pleasurable.

Maybe I'm the only one who nurses some of my defects—but I don't think so, from what I've heard at my AA meetings. It seems like we all do it. Isn't there a song with the lyric, "Hurts so good"? That's what I'm talking about.

Somehow when it comes to me, though, my defect always seems so understandable, absolutely justified: No one cares about me. My feelings are hurt. Poor me. Why does this always happen to me? Why does everyone do this to me? As I once heard at a recovery retreat, the way to deal with a defect is to break in and say "Stop it!" when I am obsessing on it. Just stop—and let it go. Easier said than done, of course.

I sometimes think of letting go as releasing a colorful balloon into the sky. Like a child, I don't want to lose it; I have the string tied tightly around my finger. But if I want to be free, I have to let that cherished thing float up to the sky. It looks so light as it floats up, but it's really a heavy harness on my neck, keeping me tethered to old ways that don't work anymore. It actually feels so much better when it's gone.

So here's where I try to do my part. I say to myself, "Stop it. Let it go," right in the middle of doing it if I can. Stop thinking that thought or talking about that person for the millionth time. Stop dragging myself down. Then I ask my Higher Power to help me.

I can't say that I ever do this perfectly. But like the rest of us, I keep trying. BY: LYNNE D. | CARBONDALE, ILLINOIS

The Conference recognizes that the chief initiative and active responsibility in most world service matters should be exercised by the trustee members of the Conference acting as the General Service Board.

Concept VI – A.A. Functions Democratically in Principle While Also Following a Corporate Model in Its Business Operations.

The first five Concepts provide the foundation for Alcoholics Anonymous to operate democratically as a fellowship. Then, in Concept VI, Bill adds discussion of how A.A. at the level of its world services is also a very large business. He introduces the "corporate model" as the basis for A.A. business operations.

A.A. is both a fellowship and a corporation? How complicated is that? It's beginning to sound like Bill had never heard of KISS. I now also needed to figure out why A.A. has and needs two operational sides, working closely together--both the General Service Conference and the General Service Board. Then I was told to read on through Concepts 6, 7, and 8 to really understand.

Bill elaborates on what he means by the "corporate model", saying that "Our Trustees must function almost exactly like the directors of any large business corporation. They must have ample authority to effectively manage and conduct A.A.'s business." Aha! I am beginning to understand. A simple way to think of this is that the A.A. General Service Conference is critical to our working harmoniously together as a fellowship, while the General Service Board, the Trustees, assures that we follow sound business practices, although these purposes do overlap.

Bill says that our Trustees need to be given a wide latitude of judgment and action. They need this because we A.A.'s are holding them mainly responsible for all our service activities. The Trustees have the legal and practical responsibility for the operation of A.A. World Services, Inc. which embraces A.A. publishing as well as the General Service Office, and of the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. These entities have a combined cash flow of many millions of dollars annually. The Trustees are also responsible for A.A.'s public information activities. They are the guardians of the Twelve Traditions. They are responsible for carrying the A.A. message to countries around the world. They are A.A.'s "bankers", overseeing the financial operations and investing A.A.'s substantial Reserve Fund. They are busy people who hold a great deal of responsibility for the effectiveness of A.A. workings.

Who are these Trustees to whom we give such authority? They fall into two categories: Class A and Class B. Class A Trustees are persons who are not and have not been afflicted by the disease of alcoholism and who express a profound faith in the recovery program upon which A.A. was founded. They are persons who have been friends of A.A., including members of professions such as medicine, law, the clergy, finance, or any other field that may have occasion to work with alcoholics, and whose personal and/or professional expertise and dedication can be invaluable to our Fellowship. Class B Trustees are sober A.A. members who have been nominated through our General Service committees and usually are members who have been deeply involved in A.A.

All Trustee nominations, Class A and Class B, are approved by the General Service Conference. Trustees serve a limited term. All serve as volunteers with no monetary payment. Each serves out of a 'labor of love' for Alcoholics Anonymous.

I have learned through the study of Concept VI that the General Service Board Trustees give us assurance that our business matters, particularly, are well taken care of. I am confident that the Trustees will perform their tasks effectively, guard our Traditions well, and serve our A.A. Society throughout the world. This ultimately frees me to devote my attention to carrying out our Fellowship's primary purpose found in Tradition Five--to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.





Not a river in Egypt

Even in sobriety, denial ruled his life. But Step Six and a cool Higher Power helped him begin to accept reality and lift his head out of the sand

"Your daughter has something in her lung," the doctor said. "She needs to have it removed and it needs to be today."

My daughter was 18 months old when she inhaled a popcorn seed deep into her left lung. It was a big deal and had to be surgically removed. When the doctor used words like "probability of death" and said, "She could incur permanent damage," well, let's just say that I handled the news like I usually handle anything that scares me. "This doctor is nuts," I said to my wife. "We should get a second opinion." And some vodka, I thought to myself.

Denial. We all live with it. It's the first of the five stages of grief. Denial not only presents itself in my life when someone dies, but whenever anything happens that involves having to accept any kind of change that scares me. I go into denial at work, over finances, with my kids, my wife, my sponsor. Doesn't matter. If something is about to happen and I don't want it to happen, then it didn't happen. Denial is one of my defects of character. It is the first aggressive angle I take to say no to reality.

As an alcoholic, I use denial as a weapon because I really, really want things to go on as they were. People tend to retreat when I get snide and cocky. I'm really good at it and I'm even better at it when I'm hammered.

When it came to my drinking, my denial was unbreakable. There wasn't a spouse, a parent, a therapist, a friend or a religion that could convince me that I had a problem. And even when alcohol stopped working for me physically, mentally, spiritually and socially, I still wanted it in my life. That's how powerful the obsession was for me. I did not want to stop drinking.

So when I got to AA and accidentally got a sponsor, I did what any upstanding drunk would do when it came to Step One: I faked it. "Oh, yes. I am an alcoholic," I said. "I am powerless over alcohol. Sure, my life is unmanageable." I'm ready for Step Two, suckers!

But as I faked it, even though I was staying sober, my life got worse. My wife asked for a divorce after I got sober; my relationship with my kids broke after I got sober; I saw my financial situation failing after I got sober; I realized I had no friends after ... shall I go on? My life really was unmanageable. It's amazing what a few weeks of "undrunkness" will show a person. I was in serious denial over all of it.

I have said in meetings many, many times: the only thing that alcohol has ever given me was the gift of desperation. Desperation drove me to try a couple of new things that were foreign to me—honesty and God. I was terrible at honesty when I got to AA. I lied and distorted everything for personal gain and to avoid confrontation. Even when I could tell the truth, I lied. Just a little tweak here and a little fake there and I looked like an even bigger hero, or a much more generous person, or a martyr or just an all-around great guy. It took a lot for me to go to a meeting and finally admit that I used alcohol to fix my life and that I didn't want to stop, that I was scared, unhappy and alone. But from that moment on, my life has not been the same.

That was my first lesson in true acceptance, and it is acceptance that eventually overcomes denial in my life. I don't have to be OK with a situation that develops. I just have to stop denying that the situation is there. If I work an honest program, acceptance soon follows.

I did get to make one choice as an alcoholic. I got to pick a cool Higher Power, and that Higher Power will exist as long as I try to give him my life and connect with him every single day.

Every now and then, the old version of me pops in for a sneak attack, but it only takes over temporarily, thanks to the Steps and all the other resources that AA has given me: meetings, a good sponsor, literature, good conversation with other alcoholics and some service work equals acceptance. It is all wrapped up in the power of my God.

I pray for the newcomer and for anyone who is starting over in this program to get a good sponsor to take them through honest Step work, so that they can ultimately seek and find a Higher Power to manage their daily lives.

God was there for my daughter during her surgery. Even though I didn't know him very well at the time, he was there. He was always around, actually. With the help of AA, I can see him in my life now and it is amazing.

For today, I feel that AA is and always will be a part of my life. God willing, I'm not in denial about that. BY: R.T. | QUEEN CREEK, ARIZONA

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My name is Diana, I am an alcoholic and the Liaison for the English-speaking Area 42 AA community for the Pacific Region 26th Anniversary of La Viña Committee. My service as liaison encompasses sharing and utilizing all the available resources of communication within the entire Area 42 English-speaking fellowship, both north and south, online as well as in person to this event committee.

Last fall, when I found out that a host committee for the 26th Anniversary of La Viña (Grapevine in Spanish) was being put together with headquarters in Las Vegas' District 21, I wanted to see what it was all about. I soon realized that this was a unique opportunity to help widen our sense of mutual belonging and to strengthen the unity between the English and Spanish speaking AA communities in our Area. For many years, the Hispanic AA community has been supporting their "meeting in print" by holding writing workshops to record their stories and since 2011 has organized celebratory anniversaries in the Pacific Region to promote and raise awareness among Spanish-speaking members.

Our Anniversary committee have been very busy from the beginning with our members getting together every Tuesday night, giving monthly progress reports at their Intergroup and District 21 meetings as well as for the "Junta de Enlaces" which is a special meeting for La Viña Liaisons in the Pacific Region. Just about every week visits are organized to reach out to all the local Hispanic AA home groups in Las Vegas as a means to present the history and purpose of La Viña plus special gatherings for writing workshops. Also, out-of-town excursions are coordinated over entire weekends to participate in Hispanic AA State Conventions and visits to just about every Area, Hispanic district, and state in the Pacific Region — (except for Hawaii and Alaska, of course!). Every presentation, announcement, and visit has been done in person.

An amazing program has been put together with involvement from different areas and Hispanic districts within the Pacific Region as well as participation from the Associate Editor of La Viña, Karina C., a Trustee from the General Service Board, Paz P.; the Area 42 Grapevine Chair, Jason M.; our very own Area 42 Delegate, Julie C., and Marita R. who is a Trustee at Large. This is quite a line up!!
