In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

I KISSED MY BABY GOODBYE

A mother goes to jail at nine months sober, yet finds a beautiful way to get through

I was nine months and one day sober when I was sentenced to two years in prison for my fourth DUI. I was 29 years old, married, and the mama of a redheaded baby boy. I thought my life was over. But I had yet to find out what old-timers already know: Happiness is in the journey, not the destination.

On Nov. 9, 2011, I got sober for what I hope to be the final time. I'd been trying to get and stay sober since I was 22, but the only thing that I'd done perfectly over the years was to return to AA every time I fell flat on my face. I was doing well for a while: I was sober, married, working fulltime, and had a baby. Life got good and I got comfortable. I forgot where I came from; I forgot how bad it would get once I picked up that first drink. Gradually, I stopped doing all of the things that were keeping me sober, and I started drinking again.

I'd been going to court twice a month after I got sober again and I lived in constant fear. Not knowing what to do, I went to see my sponsor. She told me to pray to have God's will work in my life. That was not the answer I wanted to hear! I was facing some serious jail time, and that was the best she could tell me? But I did it anyway. I was angry when I was sentenced to two years in jail.

I called up my sponsor, crying and yelling, and she told me I was at a turning point in my sobriety: Either God is everything, or he is nothing. She added that I had to accept that either he has a plan for me (and it's far greater than anything I could ever imagine) or he doesn't. What was it going to be? I was desperate. I was out of ideas, and I didn't know what else to do, so I decided to trust and turn my will and my life over to God.

I kissed my husband and my baby goodbye, and I went to serve my time. I served 363 days in the county jail, and I was never alone because I had God and the people of Alcoholics Anonymous with me every step of the way.

Leaving my husband and my baby was the hardest thing that I've ever had to do, but I had to clean up the wreckage of my past before I could be in the present. My sponsor told me that there were people in jail that I could help, and I thought she was crazy! But God is clever, and he placed in my path a girl who was three days sober and was filled with fear. In jail, I had the honor and privilege of taking her through the Steps. After she went home, there was another girl who needed help. So again, I was able to give back what had been so freely given to me—in the last place that I could ever have expected. That was an incredible gift.

Today I know that God has a plan for me, and it's far greater than anything I could've ever imagined. If going to jail for a year was what it took for me to get sober, then I'll take it. And if I can help even just one woman with my experience, then it has all been worth it. I have 26 months sober today, and that has nothing to do with me. That's God working. Today my life is beautiful, and I get to be a part of it—because I'm sober.

Concept III – Right of Decision Applies to all Levels of Participation in the Structure of A.A. World Services.

You should be familiar with the Conference Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board as background for this Concept, both of which are found in The A.A. Service Manual. For, except for the specific directions in these documents, every trusted servant and every A.A. entity — at all levels of service — has the right "to decide . . . how they will interpret and apply their own authority and responsibility to each particular problem or situation as it arises." That is, they can "decide which problems they will dispose of themselves and upon which matters they will report, consult, or ask specific directions." This is "the essence of 'The Right of Decision.'" But this right also means the Fellowship must have trust in its "trusted servants." If the groups instruct their G.S.R.s rather than giving them a "Right of Decision," then the area conference is hamstrung. If the G.S.R.s instruct the area delegates rather than giving them a "Right of Decision," then the General Service Conference is hamstrung. As Bill points out, "our Conference delegates are primarily the servants of A.A. as they should . . . cast their votes . . . according to the best dictates of their own judgment and conscience at that time." Similarly, if the General Service Board, acting through its subsidiary boards, "were to attempt to manage" the General Service Office and the AA Grapevine "in detail, then . . . the staff members . . . would quickly become demoralized; they would be turned into buck-passers and rubber stamps; their choice would be to rebel and resign, or to submit and rot." Bill warns against using "The Right of Decision" as an excuse for failure to make the proper reports of actions taken; or for exceeding a clearly defined authority; or for failing to consult the proper people before making an important decision. But he concludes: "Our entire A.A. program rests squarely upon the principle of mutual trust. We trust God, we trust A.A., and we trust each other."

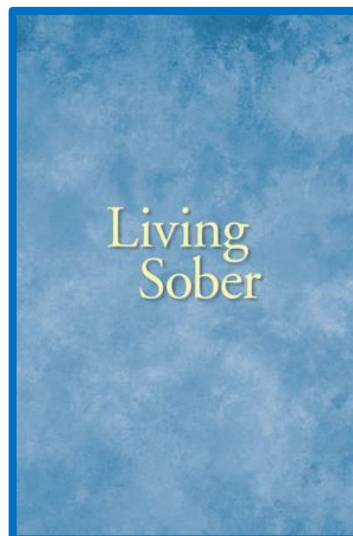

 - o One serves primarily women. The women's building could get by with every other week if volunteers are scarce. If another day is better for the women's building, we can do that too, any day but Wednesday works for them.
 - o One at the main building. Requested every week.

Requirements:

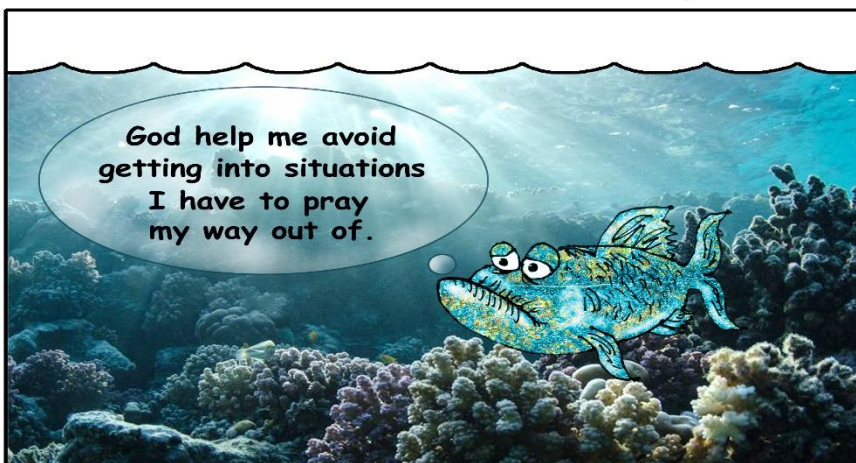
- All volunteers must be vaccinated against Covid.
- New volunteers to Lake's Crossing must undergo a quick background check which isn't to explore all legal entanglements, just current ones that are open.
- Orientation. This could be done at any of the TB Tests/readings. Please coordinate with Melissa Curley, facility coordinator. 775-688-0492
- The third step which is the most labor intensive is the 2 step TB test. This requires the person to come in to get test administered, then come back 3 days to get it read, then come back a week from the first administration, they have to come back again to get the other arm tested and then return again 3 day later.
 - o The facility is a 24 hr facility so nurses are available all day to read the tests at your convenience.

To the Amazing Northern Nevada Fellowship:

Hi my name is Don D and I am an alcoholic. I serve as the Secretary for Intergroup for Northern Nevada. I wanted to take a moment to recognize a couple of things from this month and say thank you.

Since March 2020, NNIG has had moments where we have not gotten to hear the voice of our fellowship as much as we would have liked to. As things happened we saw our Service Committee positions become empty and our monthly business meeting attendance down. Through all of that though there were many who continued to suit up and show up reminding us AA was alive and well. This last Wednesday the Sparks Alano Club room was filled with members representing their home groups, those trusted servants who have taken service chair commitments, and others who just wanted to continue to be a presence for our body. It was a moment that made me take pause to be reminded of how it is a We thing. I was absolutely excited to the core to see so many faces, to hear presentations well prepared, and to have new trusted servants ask the body to take things back so we can honor the 2nd Tradition of the group conscience of all those in Northern Nevada AA who contribute.

It was fitting to have that be the result of a wintery February that gave way to an incredible showing. This time of year is one where we honor our voice and the best truths found by listening carefully and hearing what all is to be said. In how we say these things we display our knowledge of the Traditions in how we treat each other. I have heard "what we get done here will never be as important as how we treat each other." That to me is how we live the traditions and "walk the walk" of that spirit that is spoken of in the 9th Concept for our trusted servants. My greatest hope as we come back together in the next couple of months to discuss the preamble is that we take pause before we speak and listen to know that our truth may not be the only one. I hope everyone remembers that the Right of Decision is there, as is the Right of Appeal. I hope we are reminded of how all the Traditions distill back down to the first of Unity, and whatever decision we make we do it by thorough discussion where every voice is heard that cares to be.

I also encourage all the groups who care to participate to please look at the upcoming General Service Conference Agenda items that will be presented at the Northern Area Roundtables and Area 42 Spring Assembly. Please share with your GSR or DCM how you see those items and what they mean to you for the future of how we not only reach the still suffering alcoholic today but the ones not yet born. We face challenges as we always have in how we best make 12th Step work possible. One of the ways we can best ensure that we do is by hearing your voice. It counts as all the voices before us have helped us never let good be the enemy of the best. We have a whole new generation of alcoholics who are finding their information in new ways and we must meet them there. As Bill W. said in the 1960 General Service Conference "Our 12 Steps probably won't change; the

Traditions, not at all likely. But our manner of communication, our manner of organizing ourselves for function, for service-let us hope that this goes on changing for the better, forever." Our Delegate, Jake S, from the South and our Alternate Delegate, Paul E. will be focused on Public Information. How can we let people who don't yet know who we are or what we do/don't do find us in a new age? Please think about this and bring your voice to AA so we can always find the collective conscious of who we are.

"Tasting Is Not Drinking"

An AA has a reminder of the cunning nature of alcoholism while on a trip with his wife

A few years ago, my wife and I were in Galena, Ill. for a weekend. Galena is a kind of tourist town with bed and breakfasts, motels, trendy stores and antique shops. There is also a winery retail store. When I was drinking, I seldom drank wine. It was one of the few things I did not drink.

While we were there, my wife wanted to go to the winery to get some wine for her brothers and sisters. I said OK since I never drank it anyway.

Now, I had always heard that there would be times in every alcoholic's life during which he would be powerless over the first drink. I always thought that was meant for other people. I have a good program. I work the Steps, go to meetings, and pray. It won't happen to me, I figured. Until I got to Galena.

We went into the wine shop at 11 a.m. The store was filled with bottles of wine and all the accessories: decanters, cork screws, wine racks. There was a bar with about four or five people sitting at it, sampling wines.

A guy behind the bar was talking about the fruitiness and bouquet of various wines. The reality was that they were drinking at 11 a.m. for free.

I felt myself being drawn to the bar like a magnet, and for a brief moment I thought, "Tasting is not drinking." It would be OK. I was frozen, afraid to move. I started sweating and was really scared. I really wanted to go over and drink the wine. I took a few deep breaths, and asked the man upstairs to get me out of there.

I walked over to my wife and told her that I could not stay there. I went outside and sat on the front step. It was about October, about 40 degrees and windy. I sat there for 20 minutes and thanked my higher power for getting me out of there.

If I had stepped the other way, I probably wouldn't be here now. At that moment, I was truly powerless over the first drink.


