In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS HAS NO OPINION ON OUTSIDE ISSUES; HENCE THE AA NAME OUGHT NEVER BE DRAWN INTO PUBLIC CONTROVERSY.

NEVER since it began has Alcoholics Anonymous been divided by a major controversial issue. Nor has our fellowship ever publicly taken sides on any question in an embattled world. This, however, has been no earned virtue. It could almost be said that we were born with it, for as one oldtimer recently declared, "Practically never have I heard a heated religious, political or reform argument among AA members. So long as we don't argue these matters privately, it's a cinch we never shall publicly."

As by some deep instinct, we AAs have known from the very beginning that we must never, no matter what the provocation, publicly take sides in any fight, even a worthy one. All history affords us the spectacle of striving nations and groups finally torn asunder because they were designed for, or tempted into, controversy. Others fell apart because of sheer self-righteousness while trying to enforce upon the rest of mankind some millennium of their own specification. In our own times we have seen millions die in political and economic wars often spurred by religious and racial difference. We live in the imminent possibility of a fresh holocaust to determine how men shall be governed, and how the products of nature and toil shall be divided among them. That is the spiritual climate in which AA was born, and by God's grace has nevertheless flourished.

Concept X

Our service structure cannot function effectively and harmoniously unless, at every level, each operational responsibility is matched by a corresponding authority to discharge it. This requires that authority must be delegated at every level — and that the responsibility and authority of every entity are well defined and clearly understood. As we have seen (Concept I) "final responsibility and ultimate authority" reside with the A.A. groups, and they delegate this authority to the Conference (Concept II). The Conference, in turn, delegates to the General Service Board the authority to manage A.A.'s affairs (Concept VI) in its behalf. The board is in authority over its subsidiary operating corporations - A.A. World Services, Inc. and AA Grapevine, Inc. — but it delegates to the directors of those corporations the authority necessary to run these service entities. The directors are in authority over the executives of the corporations, but delegate to these officers the authority needed to carry out their administrative responsibilities. And finally, the executives delegate to the G.S.O. and Grapevine staff members and other employees the authority necessary to carry out their important service jobs.

"It is perfectly clear," says Bill, "that when delegated authority is operating well, it should not be constantly interfered with." Otherwise, he warns, "those charged with operating responsibly will be demoralized." For example, the General Service Board owns the two operating corporations

and its authority over them is absolute. "Nevertheless, so long as things go well, it is highly important that the trustees do not unnecessarily interfere with or usurp the operating authority of these entities." "To sum up: Let us always be sure that there is an abundance of final or ultimate authority to correct or to reorganize; but let us be equally sure that all of our trusted servants have a clearly defined and adequate authority to do their daily work and to discharge their clear responsibilities."



TRADITION TEN CONTINUED

Let us re-emphasize that this reluctance to fight each other or anybody else is not counted as some special virtue in which we feel superior to other people. Nor does it mean that the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, now restored as citizens of the world, are going to back away from their individual responsibilities to act as they see the right upon issues of our time. But when it comes to AA as a whole, that's guite a different matter. In this respect we do not enter into public controversy, because we know that our society will perish if it does. We conceive the survival and spread of Alcoholics Anonymous to be something of far greater importance than the weight we could collectively throw back of any other cause. Since recovery from alcoholism is life itself to us, it is imperative that we preserve in full strength our means of survival.

Maybe this sounds as though the alcoholics in AA had suddenly gone peaceable, and become one great big happy family. Of course this isn't so at all. Human beings that we are, we squabble. Before we leveled off a bit, AA looked more like one prodigious squabble than anything else, at least on the surface. A corporation director who had just voted a company expenditure of a hundred thousand dollars would appear at an AA business meeting and blow his top over an outlay of twenty-five dollars' worth of needed postage stamps. Disliking the attempt of some to manage a group, half its membership might angrily rush off to form another group more to their liking. Elders, temporarily turned Pharisee, have hurled rocks. Bitter attacks have been directed against people suspected of mixed motives. Despite their din, our puny rows never did AA a particle of harm. They were just part and parcel of learning to work and live together. Let it be noted, too, that they were almost

always concerned with how to make AA more effective, how to do the most good for the most alcoholics.

The Washingtonian Society, a movement among alcoholics of a century ago, almost discovered the answer to alcoholism. At first the society was composed entirely of alcoholics trying to help each other. The early members foresaw that they should dedicate themselves to this sole aim. In many respects, the Washingtonians were akin to AA of today. Their membership passed the hundred-thousand mark. Had they been left to themselves, and had they stuck to their one goal, they might have found the rest of the answer. But this didn't happen. Instead, the Washingtonians permitted politicians and reformers, both alcoholic and nonalcoholic. to use the society for their own purposes. Abolition of slavery, for example, was a stormy political issue then. Soon Washingtonian speakers violently and publicly took sides on this question. Maybe the society could have survived the Abolition controversy. but it didn't have a chance from the moment it determined to reform America's drinking habits. When the Washingtonians became crusaders, within a very few years they had completely lost their effectiveness in helping alcoholics. The lesson to be learned from the Washingtonians was not overlooked by Alcoholics Anonymous. As we surveyed the wreck of that movement, early AA members resolved to keep our society out of public controversy. Thus was laid the cornerstone for Tradition Ten: "Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the AA name ought never be drawn into public controversy."

Thoughts on the Tenth Step

The Tenth Step is the teen years of the Steps for me. This Step makes me start acting like an adult or make my amends. For me, it is about honesty, humility, courage and acceptance.

Honesty is something I had to learn. I am still learning how to be completely honest. In "how it works," it talks a little about honesty. I needed to grasp and develop a manner of living that demands rigorous honesty.

I learned how to look at my actions with honesty: Did I do my best? Were my actions based on fear, anger or love? Am I looking at my actions, and not just my intentions? Am I telling the whole story or just the parts I want others to hear? And at the end of the day, I ask myself: Did I do what I said I would do?

Humility teaches me that there are other people here besides me. I'm not always first or last; sometimes others get the job, the girl, or whatever it is sometimes.

With humility, I can learn what my strengths and weaknesses are and what I'm good at and what I need to work on. I'm no better or worse than anyone else.

I've learned that there is no "us or them," nor "me or you." There is only "we." We are all just trying to get through this life as best we can.

I have to remember to pray for courage to do the things I need to do and to do God's will. I need to pray for the courage to change my actions when I'm having problems with people, places and things. And courage to look at my part in a problem and make my amends. I ask for the courage to do the mundane things in life I need to do but don't want to. And the courage to do things to improve my life. Lastly, I pray for the courage to say I'm wrong.

Acceptance has a big learning curve for me. I try not to waste so much time trying to changing things that aren't mine to change. Acceptance for me is that I'm the one who needs to change in accordance with people, places, and things.

Interview with an alcoholic

Please introduce yourself. *My name is Barbara F*.

What is your sobriety date? *February 7. 1974.*

What is your home group? *Aloha Group at the Triangle.*

Where did you get sober at? *In LA.*

Briefly describe your drinking .

I didn't drink that much. I was a medical assistant in school and a teacher saw that I was having a problem. And she put me in Friendly House, a woman's recovery home. And that's where I got started in the recovery home.

What were your first impressions of Alcoholics Anonymous? *It was a new way of life for me.*

What did the long-timers tell you in the beginning?

Keep coming back.

What was the hardest suggestion for you to follow?

Don't drink. Keep coming back and don't drink.

How did you not drink when you wanted to drink?

I went to A.A. meetings.

What was the easiest suggestion for you to follow?

Keep coming back.

When did you come to Reno?

My husband worked in Texas as a petrochemical designer and we would fly here from Texas to Reno and I had a timeshare. We would stay in the timeshare and we would drive to see our folks in California.

We said when we retired, we're going to live here. He died in 2008 when he had 18 years of sobriety.

Did you meet him in A.A.?

Yes, we used to go to a club in California, Long Beach and he was on one side of the room and I was on the other side of the room; next thing you know, we were together. We went to Australia and New Zealand and we got married in Australia. We always wanted to go to Australia and I said. Why don't we go and get married? So we contacted a justice of the peace in Australia and we were married by a justice of the Peace on a little golf course.

Do you see a difference between A.A. in Reno and the other places that you've lived? **No. It's basically the same.**

What do you like to tell newcomers today? Keep coming back.

Have you seen any changes in A.A.? It's been about the same, the messages keep coming back and your life will get better and mine has.


This lady Barbara, was my sponsor at the time, we would go up to a woman's prison once a month and carry the message. Unfortunately Barbara went back out and they found her with a needle in her arm. I don't know if she ever made it back or not. But she was my first sponsor.

Do you think that going into prison was helpful for you in your sobriety? **Yeah, we would carry the message to them, they were all happy to see us.**

What's been your favorite service that you've done in Alcoholics Anonymous? *The prison.*

Do you have any final thoughts? I love A.A. It has been my life. February 7th I will have 50 years.

I probably wouldn't be alive today. I had drank a bottle of Brandy. That was my last drink and I was knocked out on the floor and my mom found me and called the ambulance. And then they took me to the hospital. Then I went to the halfway house. Interviewed July 2023
