Interview with an Alcoholic

Dave W. Reno NV

### Can you please introduce yourself?

Yes, my name is Dave W. My sobriety date is December 10th, 1970 and my Homegroup is A Way Home in Reno Nevada

Where did you get sober at?

Reno, NV.

### Briefly describe your drinking.

I like what I have heard others say. At first, my drinking was fun, then it was fun with trouble, and then it was just trouble. My drinking lasted from about the age of 13 and ended when I was 26 years old. Those years were filled with broken cars, broken promises, and about 10+ years of broken living.

How did you end up getting into Alcoholics Anonymous? It was Labor Day 1969. I was supposed to rough in the plumbing system in a house that was being built. I got drunk instead and woke up in the hospital. I could not remember what happened that day but I knew I was in trouble. I was in bed in a private room with no clothes nor underwear so I had to stick around.

### That got you into A.A.?

I was escorted by my brother to the Elko County Court House on Labor Day, 1969, and the judge, a friend of my father's, sentenced me to up to one year in the alcoholic ward at the Nevada State Mental Hospital. I was 24 years old at the time and started to go to a few A.A. meetings for something to do.

### What were your first impressions?

In truth, I was really scared. I was in the State hospital. I had been in trouble off and on for the last few years, but nothing like that. When I was about 11 years old, I flew down to Reno with the Sheriff of Elko County to a Boy Scout camp. My next plane trip to Reno was to the state hospital with the same sheriff. That was my introduction to A.A. or introduction to a different way of life, which I was not interested in at all.

### When did you become interested in A.A.?

I started my last drunk in 1970, the Labor Day weekend, and I was pretty much drunk every day after that till December 9th of that year.

**Concept XII** The Warranties also express spiritual principles which apply to all other A.A. entities as well. Let us, then, consider these principles one by one: Warranty One: "The Conference shall never become the seat of perilous wealth or power."

Warranty Two: "Sufficient operating funds, plus an ample Reserve, should be its prudent financial principle."

Warranty Three: "None of the Conference members shall ever be placed in a position of ungualified authority over any of the others."

Warranty Four: "That all important decisions should be reached by discussion, vote, and wherever possible, by substantial unanimity."

Warranty Five: "That no Conference action shall ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy."

Warranty Six: "That though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action."







### STEP TWELVE FREQUENT CONTACT

Some favorite passages in the Big Book help a father get through the darkest days of his life.

"Mister L., are you sitting down?" the voice said. Never a good question. At a little over seven years sober, I was on a call from the hospital telling me that my 8-year-old daughter had had a stroke.

At the time, I was walking with forearm crutches and I didn't drive, so I arranged for a ride to the hospital as quickly as possible. It was about an hour's drive away, but I was able to get there and see my daughter.

I was able to visit every other hour so that I wouldn't be in the room at the same time as my exwife. Since I had no transportation and wanted to be with my daughter every moment possible, I was not able to get to any AA meetings.

For the next two weeks and two days, I camped out at the hospital. My daughter fell into a coma after a second stroke. Much praying, daily phone conversations with my sponsor, and most importantly, continuous work with sponsees helped me immensely through this time.

But then, on December 21, my daughter passed away. I don't know whether I wanted to drink or not but I sure did want to stop the pain. Luckily, a passage in the Big Book kept ringing in my head: "Practical experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics. It works when other activities fail."

I had been working with a few sponsees who came by the hospital, but now I felt I needed more. So I went to an AA meeting that night and cried inconsolably and a stranger held my hand through the whole meeting.

The next night I went to another meeting, but this time a friend who had gone back to drinking approached me in tears. "I want to stop drinking but I can't," he said. "Will you help me?" I spent the next two hours with him and never mentioned my daughter until we were nearly done. "How's your little girl?" he asked. He hadn't heard that she had passed. I told him that his problem was my main concern right then. Where had those words come from? They were not mine.

My daughter's funeral was on December 24. I wept as we left her graveside. I got in the car with my parents to head home. Mom said, "You shouldn't be alone; why don't you come home with us?" She was half right. I could hear Bill W.'s words from our book: "Frequent contact with newcomers and with each other is the bright spot of our lives."

Since it was Christmas Eve, I knew there was an alkathon going on across town, so I had my folks drop me off there. I shared, which helped me some, but the line "It works when other activities fail" kept echoing in my head.

Sometime during the night, a drunk came into the alkathon smelling of stale booze and vomit. I fixed him a sandwich and a coffee and we sat and talked and attended a few meetings together. I don't know if I helped him at all, but neither of us drank that night.

My addiction to my own thoughts has been replaced by the sounds of nature and the world.

At 72 years old, I feel young and truly alive. You can catch me giggling for no reason or exclaiming quietly before a meeting starts, "I love this meeting!" A sense of joy keeps arising from within me. I only have to be truly present to be joyful and filled with love and peace.

## In a moment of crisis, he learned that sobriety doesn't depend on personalities.

When I was a few years sober in AA, I received a telephone call early one morning in New York from the West Coast, telling me that my sister had had a brain aneurysm and was in a coma. I flew out the next morning and found that she had come out of the coma and her husband and grown children were there in the hospital visiting her. They were very much relieved. However, that night she suffered a setback and went into a coma again. After having their hopes raised, her family went into a state of depression and shock. The tension among them was palpable and some were trying to cope with it by having a few drinks. After a couple of days of living with this tension myself, I decided I better get to an AA meeting as a safeguard against picking up a drink.

At the meeting, I mentioned the situation with my sister. Those around the table seemed solemn while I spoke but when the meeting closed they noisily sought out their friends. I just stood there expecting I don't know what, but feeling very isolated. A young woman came over and said she'd say a prayer for my sister. I thanked her and left the hall.

A couple of days later my sister died. The wake and funeral were emotionally draining and I knew I needed another meeting so I went back to the same AA group since it was the only one convenient to where I was staying. I told them my sister had died. There were the same brief solemn looks, the same loud seeking out of friends at the end of the meeting, and the same feeling of isolation in myself. I left the hall this time nurturing a terrific resentment.

It wasn't until some weeks later that I realized that my attending these meetings had been a great success. I went to them as insurance so that I wouldn't pick up a drink during an extremely tense time. And it worked--I didn't pick up a drink. I realized too that if I had been in my home group--or in most other AA groups for that matter--there no doubt would have been a lot more concern shown. This group didn't respond that way, but it also dawned on me that I had no right to demand that they do. In fact I had no right to demand anything of them. The important thing is that they were *there;* they had a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous--and I had a place to go to remind myself that I am an alcoholic and that I can't drink no matter what is happening in my life. I didn't drink and so those meetings worked for me very well.

The experience brought out for me some very basic AA: I don't go to Alcoholics Anonymous for my social life (although I have a lot of good friends in AA) or simply to feel good. Also, I have no right to demand that other AAs act in a way I want them to. My primary reason for going to AA is to stay sober and to grow in sobriety. The bottom line is that sobriety is basic in my life and for my life, and maintaining it on a daily basis is much too important for me to have it depend on the whims, responses, or personalities of others. As the Twelfth Tradition clearly states: "Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities." Principles before personalities: Keeping that priority straight, I hope I'll stay sober on a daily basis, and everything else will assume its proper place in my life.

Dave W. Continued from page 1 I was at the point of losing my job and everything that I had that I had been so lucky to get before my drinking got totally out of hand again. When I was in the state hospital, I heard about a job with the trucking company, Delta Truck Lines and I asked my brother-in-law if he cared if I made out an application since he wasn't going to apply. I was at the state hospital and I had to make an appointment, so I called up Delta Truck Lines. I asked if I could speak to Mr. Dwyer, he was the terminal manager. I said I heard you had a job available for a billing clerk, and I wondered if I could make an application. He told me where they were located. He said to come to the terminal and fill out an application. I said, "there's one thing you ought to know, Mr. Dwyer, I'm a patient in the state hospital and I'm in here for Alcoholism." I can't believe what he said. "Well, come on down and I'll talk to you".

When I was about 10 years sober I had the most incredible thing happen in my life. That was Shaun D. and my life was to change forever. For fun Shaun and I were going to see a spiritual medium but had to cancel so I asked her if she would like to go to a dinner and show at Tahoe Harrahs to see Sammy Davis Jr. She agreed so I picked her up at 5 pm on Saturday. We were driving through Washoe Valley just talking and she said "You haven't been sober very long and like it very well." My answer was that I'd been sober 10 years and I asked her how long she'd been sober, her answer was 30 days. I wanted to turn my car around and go back home. I really didn't want to date a newcomer. We did go to the show and another one that night in Reno. I am forever grateful that we were never apart for 33 years. Shaun died in the spring of 2014. Shaun was the most unique person I have ever known...everyone who knew her loved her. Because of Shaun, I feel I might be one of the luckiest people I know. A part of my heart died when Shawn W. passed on.

## Going back to when you thought you would lose your job, what made you go back to A.A.?

No, I had been going off and on. I went to A.A. after I got out of the hospital about once or twice a month. What I can say the difference was On December 10th, I quit drinking for the last time. I started going to meetings every day and did for years. That alone was huge. Then I got really active in the program for the 1st 8-10 years. I was running the Reno Rebels Group for a couple of years in different positions. Then I was elected Reno committeeman with A.A.

That was when I was sober for about six years and I was running the Driars Club and I was Reno Committeeman. Continued on page 9 The next job was to go to New York as a representative, that was my next duty. As the days went by, I thought, I can't do it, can't do it. I felt so phony because inside I was just not well. So I quit the Reno committeeman position and I quit running the Driars Club. Started more aggressively, really working on myself. I love the Driars Club and I loved being an area committee man. I would like to keep doing it, but I was just too phony. When I finally started doing my 4th step, I didn't think I'd be able to do it. Then one night, I just felt right. And the first thing I wrote was I looked phony. I act phony, and I am phony. And that's where I was at that time. **So you weren't following the suggestions very well, except for not drinking, right?** 

Well, the other thing too, the night I quit drinking, there was a guy across the street. I mean, all this is just accidental. Except God does these things. There was a guy across the street that I knew from the state hospital. I didn't like him very well, but that was fair because he didn't like me. I asked him if he would help me and he was driving me around in my car and I was crying and I said, Johnny, I'm going to do things right this time. I said, will you be my sponsor? He said "Wiggins. I wouldn't sponsor a losing \*\*\* \*\* \*\*\*\*\* like you." So I didn't have a sponsor for about 15 years. That's not good. That's just how it was. I would never recommend it to anyone. There are too many things you need sponsorship on, but I didn't have it so I had to do with what I had.

## So now you're a firm believer in sponsorship, so you do have a sponsor and you do sponsor.

I've had two sponsors. The first one was Kenny Carlisle. He was an old timer and I called him up one night. I said Kenny," I've been thinking and I wondered if you would be my sponsor." He was living in Northern California at the time. He said "Wiggins, I thought I was your sponsor." So that was like having your bases covered without even knowing it. And when he passed away I didn't wait 15 years. A few days later I asked Pat D. and Pat D. is still my sponsor.

## What changes have you seen in A.A. in the Reno area in the last 50-plus years?

It's a tough one for me to answer because in so many ways A.A. is the same. I mean it's got the same responsibilities and yet of course we've changed. One thing is the perception of people around the world about A.A. In 1970 it was not nearly as big an organization as it is now. And of course, in 1970, we thought we were the most up-to-date bunch. Well, you're up to date till you become old. 52 1/2 years later maybe more than anything as my thoughts and feelings are still way back, because that's when I got feeling good and I feel good today. But maybe with an old attitude which isn't bad.

### So elder statesmen or bleeding Deacon.

Elder statesman. In fact, I stay out of most controversies or anything now. If I get involved. I get pissed off. And I did years of that when I was going to Tonopah and all those things that get in the middle of any problem. At that level, they're all kind of weird. Egos are still too strong at that time.

## What do you like to tell newcomers when you see newcomers today?

Keep coming back. You might make it. The old-timers would tell me in the beginning, keep coming back, Dave, you might make it. That was an old timer, Pollock John. Another one, Kenny C. liked to say, "Dave, you'll never make it, but you might not drink again." I don't know what they meant, but those little sayings have been in my mind for 50-plus years, and it was those old Timers that just captured me. I just hung around the Driars Club a lot and played cards. It was nice being a part of something that I loved.

#### Now, do you have any final thoughts?

I was trying to think what it is about A.A. that I really like? Well, that's too broad of a question for me. So I would have to say it's the people. I say this at meetings all the time. 30 years ago, 35 years ago, I couldn't have said I love you. I couldn't have said it to you individually or in a room as a group of people. I joke about it, but it's really the truth. I've been like the Fonz, I couldn't have said it. Now it's easy to say that I love you. Thank you for my sobriety. Because I owe it all to you A.A.
