In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

## THE BRACER

### Replay Resentment

He had a bunch of tapes he could pop into the player and use to justify more drinking

The word "resentment" means to re-feel. I used to love getting resentments because they justified more drinking.

When someone ignored me or didn't like me, it threated my pride and self-esteem instincts. When someone dumped me, it threatened my emotional and sex instincts. When someone was promoted over me, it threatened my ambitions. When someone made more money than me, or stole from me, it threatened my financial security.

However, something like this didn't become resentment until I started up my resentment replay recorder, which was on perpetual loan from the committee in my head. I'd turn it on and re-play the pain, anger or fear I felt in whatever situation threatened me. I replay it once, then twice, then again and again. After each playback I'd hear a slightly meaner story as my magic magnifying mind embellished and distorted the truth of my original injury. Now I had serious resentments worth drinking over. They all added up too because I never got rid of any.

Whenever there was nothing bad to record, instead of recording what someone did to me, I'd record what someone might have been thinking about me. Then I'd replay that magic tape and after a while, I'd end up with resentment against myself for allowing bad things to happen to me all the time. Self-resentment soon turned into self-pity – the absolute very best reason to go out and get drunk.


# Service Concept Four:

Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional "Right of Participation," taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge.

#### Concept 4

The principle of "Right of Participation" is built into the General Service Conference through the Conference Charter. Voting members include not only delegates, but also the trustees, and the directors and staff members of A.A. World Services (i.e., GSO) and the AA Grapevine. In the same way, the boards of these two operating entities include as voting members not only trustees, but also nontrustee directors and paid administrators and staff members. The chairperson of the General Service Board appoints nontrustee members to the standing committees in order to have the advantage of their expertise, and staff members serve as committee secretaries. "There are no 'superiors,' no 'inferiors,' and no 'advisers.'" New trustees on the General Service Board and new directors of the AAWS and Grapevine boards are sometimes surprised to see paid executives, staff members and outside accountants attending the board meetings. They are invited because of A.A.'s "Right of Participation." Thus, the trustees and directors "are put into direct communication with these workers, who. . . feel wanted and needed. Although they do not vote, these workers may freely participate." Bill warns against the possibility of new delegates or trustees trying to "weaken, modify or toss out" the "Right of Participation." He cites arguments by delegates to take away the trustees', directors' and staff members' vote at the Conference. "Certainly," he says, "our trustees and service workers are not less

conscientious, experienced and wise than the delegates." "It is vital," he continues, "to preserve the traditional 'Right of Participation,' in the face of every tendency to whittle it down." Finally, there is a spiritual reason for the "Right of Participation." All of us desire to belong. In A.A., no members are "second class." The "Right of Participation" therefore reinforces Tradition Two, that no member is placed in "ultimate authority" over another. We perform our service tasks better "when we are sure we belong — when our 'participation' assures us we are truly the 'trusted servants' described in Tradition Two."







#### **Tradition 4**

### Bare-bones AA

When you're unhappy with your home group, how should you handle it? Stage a revolt? Grumble and moan? Form a faction and engage in guerrilla politics? Stay on, even when it's apparent that the group conscience has left you behind?

None of the above are constructive to serenity or good AA. But there's another choice: Quietly depart from the group, and start a new one.

That's what a dozen or so of us did five years ago after our longtime home group--I'll call them the Whiz Bangs--had strayed down paths that we didn't want to follow.

It was a strong group, with many longtime sober members. But a cadre of devoted, nonrotating officers, plus a handful of my-way-or-the-highway bleeding deacons, had locked the group into a format that robbed its former upbeat atmosphere.

The meetings alternated between dictatorship and anarchy. After each meeting opened with the moment of silence, the Serenity Prayer, the Preamble, and "How It Works," the secretary took up to ten minutes with rambling announcements. By then it was 8:20. When the members broke up into four subgroups, you couldn't be sure whether chairpersons would be on hand for each one.

Cross-addicts--many of them dropped off at the door by our local rehab centers--were allowed to engage in grassalogues and cokealogues. The treasurer insisted in keeping \$600 or more in cash reserves at all times.

Am I describing inferior AA? Not at all. The Whiz Bangs had a right to set their own policies. The group was--and still is--well-attended. But for a few of us, the former magic was gone. So we quietly split. Sometimes it's better to switch than fight.

We found another meeting place on a different night of the week, and established a closed discussion group with a bare-bones format. It may not be mainstream AA, but it seems to work for us.

We start at eight o'clock. We close at nine sharp. We try for fifty-five solid minutes of discussion in between. One way we achieve this is by eliminating nonvital announcements and "How It Works."

We open with the Serenity Prayer and the Preamble, to which we tack on these words: "This

group has determined that our discussion will be limited to AA, alcoholism, and sobriety. We therefore ask that you please refrain from references to addictions other than alcoholism." This cuts out the grassalogues without actually discouraging attendance by cross-addicts (of whom we have several).

The discussion doesn't open until someone volunteers, loud and clear, to chair next week's meeting. The chair must provide his or her own subject. We have zero tolerance for the "Does anyone here tonight have a problem?" nonsense, which allows thousands of AA discussion meetings to be derailed by members who think a love spat or burned toast are suitable topics.

We welcome visitors. Same for AA newcomers, but we don't devote entire meetings to them. You'll understand why, if you've ever seen a brand-new member--usually hungover and shaking-subjected to an hour of preaching by a roomful of old-timers who think they're inspiring the new guy with details of their own recovery.

We don't give out chips or birthday cakes, either for newcomers or old-timer anniversaries. We hold infrequent business meetings and short ones, at that. Offices rotate often. The set-up person has light duties, and for one month only. But if he or she doesn't show, or fails to get a substitute, there is unshirted hell. It's happened only once since our meeting was founded.

We're a small group, but we outdo some of the larger ones in the size and regularity of our contributions to intergroup, to the General Service Office, and to the church where we meet. In some ways we sound hardline, but our meetings are friendly and usually filled with laughter. We enjoy AA, sobriety, and each other.

After we left the Whiz Bang group, many of its members looked on us as traitors. But now some of them are drifting into our meetings, and like it. We have no argument with the Whiz Bangs or anyone else. We're neither the best AA group around, nor the worst.

We're just a small band of men and women who were out of step with an established AA group, and who elected to move on rather than stay behind and play dog in the manger. The end result was a plus for everyone concerned.

When I did my Fourth Step, I wanted to put myself down" as my biggest resentment. My sponsor said, "No way." He explained that putting myself on the list was just another example of my selfishness and self-centeredness. The Big Book instructions say to "list people, institutions or principles with whom we were angry." He'd say, "People means other people, not you".

When I did as instructed I was amazed how many resentments had piled up over the years. I had resentments going back to age six about schoolmates that had humiliated me, and family who were suffocating me. Looking at my part in my resentments, including the justifiable ones, all led to the same conclusion: selfishness and self-centeredness was my role in everything. When someone didn't do what I wanted, I began a new grudge which I beat myself up with until I could stop the pain by drinking.

I discovered that my part in my resentments over abuses I endured as a child was that I was still carrying those justifiable resentments today, rather than letting them go by forgiving those involved so I could live in this day rather than staying stuck in yesterday.

In looking at my role in my resentments, I was able to lay the groundwork for addressing the harms I had done others, despite the harms they had done to me, during my Ninth Step amends.

I've been unable to destroy my resentment replay recorder, but I have been able to return it to the committee in my head. During my sober years I've rarely had to borrow it back for very long, and as long as I perform daily maintenance on my spiritual condition I'll never need to use it.

## TRADITION FOUR

But to live in true freedom they ought to take every care that their actions do not interfere with other groups or contravene AA principles lest we lose our freedom. Our freedom only lives by our willingness to give to others that same right.

Point Four: "With respect to its own affairs, each A.A. Group should be responsible to no other authority than its own conscience. But when its plans concern the welfare of neighboring groups also, those groups ought to be consulted. And no group, regional committee or individual should ever take any action that might greatly affect A.A. as a whole without conferring with the Trustees of the Alcoholic Foundation. On such issues our common welfare is paramount."

We as groups should try to live with other groups as we try to live with fellow members in our particular group. Charity, kindness, tolerance, thoughtfulness, a striving to be unselfish--these are the hallmarks of the A.A. who is living the life of the 12 Steps. . . .
