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GENERAL WARRANTIES OF THE NORTHERN NEVADA INTERGROUP ASSOCIATION OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.


The worst meeting ever

By: ANONYMOUS | OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLAHOMA Just a little over a year ago, I met a man who was living in a treatment center. He was allowed to go to outside meetings after 30 days, and was rather enjoying himself at a very social AA conference. He told me he was quite happy to be living in that facility because he'd been living in the streets for over two years. I could tell he wasn't really that familiar with AA, but he had that newcomer drive and excitement.

Over the next couple of months, I kept running into him at all the district and area meetings. He had gotten truly involved and was in the middle of AA. He told me there were many other people at his treatment center and most of them would never know what AA is really like.

He said nobody else from the treatment center went to the conference and, sadly, he doubted if one single person would ever find out what it was like to be surrounded by so many people who understood the morning terror and madness, and yet were laughing about it. Because he seemed to be so grateful for his sobriety, I wanted to talk to him even more. He told me that the center makes all the residents attend "AA meetings" each day in their large meeting room, but those meetings are run by the residents themselves. He went on to tell me that even though they mean well, they just don't have a clue. I wondered how many people would leave that treatment center thinking AA wouldn't work for them. I made a decision to attend a meeting there the very next week, and so I did.

My first meeting there was far from sensational. In fact, I would be lying if I said anything other than it was the worst meeting I've ever been to. First off, the place was filled with people who looked like they hadn't showered in weeks or months. Everyone and everything smelled. They were wearing clothes that were torn and tattered. The treatment center doubles as a soup kitchen and a cold-weather bed shelter. Many of the residents are just looking for something warm to eat and a dry place to sleep so they can go back out and do more battle the next day. If there were a war on alcoholism, this would indeed be the trenches of the front line.


This Concept consists of the General Warranties of the General Service Conference. It is cast in stone; that is, although Bill leaves the door open for alterations and changes in the other Concepts and points out that the rest of the Conference Charter "can be readily amended," these General Warranties — like the Twelve Steps and the Twelve Traditions — be changed only by "written consent of three-quarters of all A.A. groups who respond" in the world! Why? Because "these Warranties indicate the qualities of prudence and spirituality which the Conference should always possess These are the permanent bonds that hold the Conference fast to the movement it serves." The Warranties also express spiritual principles which apply to all other A.A. entities as well. Let us, then, consider these principles one by one: Warranty One: "The Conference shall never become the seat of perilous wealth or power." The Seventh Tradition protects us against the accumulation of too much money. So long as we refuse to take outside contributions and limit contributions from individual members, "we shall not become wealthy in any perilous sense." And if we live by Tradition Two — that "our ultimate authority is a loving God" and that "our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern" — then we are safe from perilous power. Warranty Two: "Sufficient operating funds, plus an ample Reserve, should be its prudent financial principle." Although many of us as active alcoholics were free spenders, when it comes to supporting "A.A. service overhead, we are apt to turn a bit reluctant." Yet, in A.A. the cost of the service office is relatively low in terms of the number of groups served, and if the need for support is made clear, the contributions are forthcoming. The Reserve Fund should be one full year's operating expenses of the GSO and Grapevine. The Reserve Fund comes almost entirely from income from the sale of A.A. literature, which also is used to make up the deficit between group contributions and the cost of group services. Warranty Three: "None of the Conference members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others." This principle is discussed earlier in Concept IV, but "it is so important, we have made it the subject of this Warranty" — a "strong stand against the creation of unqualified authority at any point in our Conference structure. Warranty Four: "That all important decisions should be reached by discussion, vote, and wherever possible, by substantial unanimity." This Warranty is, on the one hand, "a safeguard against any hasty or overbearing authority of a simple majority; and, on the other hand, it takes notice of the rights and the frequent wisdom of minorities, however small. This principle guarantees that all matters of importance, time permitting, will be extensively debated, and that such debates will continue until a really heavy majority can support every critical decision." Warranty Five: "That no Conference action shall ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy. Although practically all other societies and governments find it necessary to punish individual members for violations of their beliefs, principles or laws, Alcoholics Anonymous finds this practice unnecessary. When we fail to follow sound spiritual principles, alcohol cuts us down. No humanly administered system of penalties is needed. This unique condition is an enormous advantage to us all, one on which we can fully rely and one which we should never abandon by resorting to personal attack and punishment. Of all societies, ours can least afford to risk the resentments and conflicts which would result were we ever to yield to the temptation to punish in anger. For much the same reason, we cannot and should not enter into public controversy, even in self defense. Our experience has shown that, providentially, A.A. has been made exempt from the need to guarrel with anyone, no matter what the provocation. Nothing could be more damaging to our unity and to the worldwide goodwill which A.A. enjoys, than public contention, no matter how promising the immediate dividends might appear. Some situations which may require Conference consideration are: A.A. may come under "sharp public attack or heavy ridicule" — perhaps "With little or no justification in fact. Our best defense in these situations would be no defense whatever — namely, complete silence at the public level. If the criticism of A.A. is partly or wholly justified, it may be well to acknowledge this privately to the critics — with our thanks." Public violations of A.A. Traditions. Our own members may try to use the A.A. name for their private purposes. "Aggressive or punitive action, even in this area, must be omitted. Privately, we can inform Tradition-violators that they are out of order. When they persist, we can use such other resources of persuasion as we have. In the long run, though, we shall have to rely mainly on the pressures of A.A. opinion and public opinion." "Another kind of problem is the severe internal disagreement that comes to unwelcome public attention." As GSO "is not a police operation," we can only offer A.A.'s experience as a matter of information. Warranty Six: "That though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action." The A.A. Traditions accord the individual member and the A.A. group extraordinary liberties. In fact, we A.A.s probably enjoy more and greater freedoms than any Fellowship in the world. We claim this as no virtue. We know we have to choose conformity to A.A.'s Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions or else face dissolution and death. "Because we set such a high value on our great liberties and cannot conceive that they will need to be limited, we here specially enjoin our General Service Conference to abstain completely from any and all acts of authoritative government which could in any way curtail A.A.'s freedom under God. We expect our Conference always to try to act in the spirit of mutual respect and love — one member to another. "Freedom under God to grow in His likeness and image will ever be the quest of Alcoholics Anonymous. May our General Service Conference be always seen as a chief symbol of this cherished liberty." Twelfth Tradition: Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

. . .On the 12th Tradition By: Doc | Portland, Oregon From the December 1949 Grapevine

Alcoholics Anonymous Traditions admonish us that to preserve harmony and to enhance the survival value of our movement, we should seriously respect the anonymous aspect of the program.

In Main Street America it is more difficult to remain anonymous, but many small town groups have found by trial and error that anonymity should be encouraged at all times.

All too often in groups we find members violating this Tradition, many, no doubt, because of lack of knowledge as to just how important anonymity is to us and why it should be respected.

The common "explosion" one usually confronts when broaching the subject is, "Why should I be ashamed of Alcoholics Anonymous? I'm proud of it, I think all of us should let everybody know we belong, etc., etc." Such a person needs to be enlightened. Personal attitudes are important, of course, but are only a minor factor concerning why we should stay nameless.

Other vital reasons are:

Anonymity is a potent reminder that we are just one among many, an infinitesimal agent of a great power. It has a very substantial spiritual significance, reminding us to respect the common welfare of the movement ahead of our own.

Anonymity stymies self-glorification and insures the other fellow the right to preserve his own identity. Who you are in AA is not important.

Anonymity protects the movement. If a group "wheel-horse" suddenly reverts to a mash diet, as sometimes happens, wraps his car around a telephone pole, makes the newsprint or the "bucket" or both, AA is left unscathed.

Anonymity fortifies us against political invasion and alignment with religious or other movements. Former movements have been destroyed by the invasion of political speakers and alignment with various sectarian organizations. By remaining strictly nameless, we bypass these and all controversial issues such as the wet and dry question and other promotional projects.

Anonymity insures us against members forming small groups, associating personal names with the wellknown name, Alcoholics Anonymous, and obtaining credit, loans or gifts for clubs, furnishings, etc., which dangerous procedure has proved disastrous in some places.

Anonymity discourages members from becoming professionals, charging fees for counseling alcoholics and other services, and prevents personal publicity in all printed material, photographs, radio, television, etc.

Let us all remember that Alcoholics Anonymous is a spiritual entity only. It has nothing to sell and doesn't want to buy anything. It gives away everything and has more for so doing. Alcoholics Anonymous belongs to all alcoholics who have a sincere desire to use its principles. Certainly all of us should feel duty bound to preserve its principles and practice, not only for ourselves, but for the millions of sick alcoholics yet to come. Few of us realized the warmth and the solace of brotherly love until we found this movement. Let us protect our anonymity and for possible disaster.

To understand, than to be understood. To love, than to be loved.

For it is by self-forgetting that one finds. It is by forgiving that one is forgiven. It is by dying that one awakens to Eternal Life.

The Worst Meeting Ever continued.

The meeting started out with an introduction as an open meeting. We went around the room and introduced ourselves and then proceeded to read all the handouts. This took almost half an hour because the people chosen to read were having such a difficult time with the words. By the time it came to start sharing, half the people had left, half the remaining people were carrying on conversations with themselves, and several had fallen asleep. Every single person in the meeting got up at one point to get coffee or to scrape ice out of a large metal chest while someone was trying to share. There were a lot of distractions.

I asked my Higher Power what he had gotten me into. It was only with his help that I was able to stay for the entire meeting. They closed with the Lord's Prayer. I was never so glad for the ending of a meeting. I had made up my mind to make a beeline out the door. I thought my work there was complete. Little did I know I hadn't even gotten started. As I was making my way toward the door, I was stopped by a little, older guy. He had obviously experienced many hard times. "You look like someone who can help me," he said. He wanted to talk. I thought he was going to ask me for money or a ride or a place to sleep. I was more than slightly reserved. He continued: "I've heard all my life that people can actually get sober from AA. I didn't believe it till about a month ago. Can you help me find a sponsor?" Right then and there, I experienced an overwhelming sense of power that wiped out all those smells, noises and sights. I stopped to talk with him and with a few others I've been doing that for over a year now and I've been asked about a sponsor many times. Several of the men actually asked me to sponsor them, and the first of them just celebrated a year of sobriety. He's been through the first part of the Big Book with me. He's been making his amends and has reestablished communication with his son. Every Wednesday night, as I walk into that treatment center, I ask God to remove from me my ego, fear, doubt and stress; that I may have the ability to deliver the program of action as outlined in our basic text; and that I share nothing beyond my experience. In this one short year, I have seen 10 men sit down with their sponsors and study the Big

Book and I am in total shock to say that all 10 of them have continued sobriety.
