
Interview with an Alcoholic **MEL J.**

Could you introduce yourself?

And I'm Mel, and I'm an alcoholic with 55 years of recovery.

When's your sobriety date?

October 26, 1969. And that was a wonderful day. I had a quite an experience. To start with, I'm one of those people that had the burning bush experience with the touch and the voice. I know it was all real. What it used to be like, when I was about 14 years old, I got all the alcohol I wanted to have at one time, and I found that I'd drink and a whole bottle of muscatel and was pretty drunk at 14. I found myself walking home. It took 4 hours to walk 4 miles. And that's pretty fast speed, I guess for a drunk. In high school I went to class. For about 3 months every morning I was drunk in my junior year. I flunked that. I also had a hit and run at that time, drank too much whiskey in 1/2 an hour and had a football game and couldn't navigate the traffic and hook the bumper on somebody else's car. Lost my driver's license for six months as a as a teenager. Things kind of straightened out a little bit after that, I got married when I was about 19 and started a family. It was a sober year. I don't know how that happened. Then, after the sober year, I began to drink at age 20 again and found that after about 8 or 10 bottles of beer, I didn't want to stop drinking. And I think if I knew anything about alcoholism, I would have known that that was a terrific sign that I had a problem. I was a strong-willed person. Stubborn. Never thought that I couldn't control anything in my life. I continued with my first wife for 12 years. I was sober two of those 12 years. One, when we first got married and 1 towards the end of it when I was full of fear that something was happening to me, I couldn't read a paragraph in a book and know what I read and I stopped drinking out of fear that for about six months. The "related facility" may be an outside group combating alcoholism – or an enterprise that A.A.'s wants to start. It was the latter that most often confronted the young Fellowship. Outside agencies were pretty scarce in those days, and some members thought A.A. should cover the whole alcoholism field. Led by a "super-promoter" (as the "Twelve and Twelve" describes him), one group built an all-purpose center, including a section for drying-out treatment. Picture any group tackling such a project! Arguments over cost, architecture, staff, fees, medication, and rules might even make the local paper. (And pity the poor newcomer straying into the group — "We'll get around to you in a minute.") Though that ambitious center failed, some individual members have since founded successful clubhouses, rest farms, halfway houses, etc. The enterprises are run by these A.A.'s and patronized by other members or prospective members. But money and property are involved. Therefore, it has proved wise to keep the operation of the facility completely separate from that of any A.A. group, and to keep "A.A." or terms like "Twelfth Step" out of the name. Toward outside agencies dealing with alcoholism, the A.A. policy is "cooperation but not affiliation." A group cooperates, for example, by welcoming referrals from clinics or by sponsoring A.A. groups in institutions. But in one area, money for a rehab was solicited at an A.A. meeting — implying affiliation. In another, A.A. was listed among beneficiaries of a United Fund drive....







The Question of Clubs

BY: LINDA W. | LIBERTYVILLE, ILLINOIS What's the connection between clubs and AA?

I had "the gift of desperation" when I got to my first AA meeting at a club not far from my home. I was ready to do whatever it took to be free from drinking. So after hearing the pitch for joining the club at the beginning of an AA meeting, I filled out the application and turned it in. That's when the old-timer I gave it to told me I had to have ninety days of sobriety before I could join. My heart sank. There was no way I would be able to stay sober for ninety days. I felt like crying.

The old-timer assured me there was nothing to cry about, however. Alcoholics Anonymous was free, and if I wanted to be a member, I was. That's all there was to it. I didn't need to fill out an application form, pay any money, or even promise sobriety.

I like to go wherever other alcoholics gather together to help one another. Most of the meetings I go to are not in a club setting, but some are. Recently, an AA member actually said she was "grateful to the club for her sobriety." Of course, I can understand how easy it is to be confused about this. But a line from the "Guidelines on Clubs," published by AA World Services, helps me to grasp the difference between AA and a club: "Even though the group meets in a club that may be composed exclusively of AA members, and many members of the group may be club members, too, the relationship of the AA group itself to the club should be the same as it would be to a church, hospital, school, or other facility in which it might rent space for its meetings."

My home group meets in a church. The people at the church office are supportive and kind. We are happy to pay them rent, but we wouldn't dream of letting them tell us what to say in a meeting. When our group first started, we discussed what to name it at the business meeting. One of the names included the name of the church where we meet. Someone pointed out that we wouldn't want to do that because it implies affiliation. We meet at the church. In no other way are we affiliated with it. Sometimes I get a helpful perspective on a Tradition by going through the Grapevine's Traditions Checklist. The questions were originally published in the Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that ran between November 1969 and September 1971. While they were originally intended for individual use, many AA groups have since used them as a basis for wider discussion.

Here is what the checklist says about Tradition Six: "Are all the officers and members of our local club for AAs familiar with the pamphlet 'Guidelines on Clubs'?"

Tradition Six is a reminder that outside facilities are separate

IN thinking about this Tradition I'm reminded of my friend George. In the fall of' 94 I was on our local intergroup call list. Late one evening, I was asked to give George a call, as he might want help. George said that he had tried "AA" before but it had never worked-during several previous stays in treatment, he'd gone to meetings there. It was a great surprise to George when I said that most of those meetings were run by the facilities; they were not AA groups but a function of the treatment center or hospital. I said I would be glad to meet him and show him the program of recovery that worked for me--as outlined in our book Alcoholics Anonymous--and introduce him to an AA group. Because of the amount of alcohol George had consumed, I suggested a medically supervised detox. After that, I agreed to meet him at my home group. Unexpectedly, I had to leave early so I arranged for George to be met by a fellow member, Jimmy D.--who became George's sponsor.

Eight years later, when Jimmy D. died, George talked about the wonderful away of life Jimmy had shared with him. George and I often reminisced about how he had given up hope of finding sobriety, and how he thought he had tried AA but had never been introduced to the program of recovery.

"While an AA group may cooperate with anyone, such cooperation ought never to go so far as affiliation or endorsement, actual or implied," AA's Sixth Tradition, long form, says. (AA's Third Tradition, long form, adds: "Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an AA group, provided that as a group they have no other affiliation.")

An alcoholic is one who drinks TWICE AS MUCH of what he shouldn't drink HALF AS MUCH of as the fellow who drinks NOTHING. Interview with an alcoholic continued from p.1 Then the fear seemed to have passed, and I stayed sober, another six months. Right after. Then I realized that I had to have a drink, so I thought I'll just have one drink. After a year of sobriety, I could do that. I hadn't been to A.A. Didn't even think about going to A.A. I was just going to do this on my own. So that one or two drinks was fine for about 3 days and then it caught up with me and I was on to another drunk. Then it just went month to month and then week to week and then day-to-day. I stayed drunk until I was 31 years old and. Then I realize that I wasn't going to see New Year's Eve that that year. I had been in Alaska for two weeks on the job and I was drunk every day up there. Full of fear, full of anxiety, full of remorse, facing a possible divorce and losing my family. I thought that suicide might be an answer, but I was too much of a coward to meet God. If He was there. I called out in my desperation to God. I didn't want to ever take a drink again, help me and nothing happened. If I'm looking back, it was a cry. Out from my mind and not my from my heart. All I wanted to do was get rid of the pain and the terrible anxiety , remorse I was feeling. So I cried out again. God help me, I don't ever want to take a drink again. That was the second time and still nothing happened. Still from my head. I just want to get rid of the pain. And the third time I'd cried out. God, please help me. I don't ever want to take a drink again. And this time it had some emotion, and it was coming from down deep inside of me. I noticed the difference right away. I felt a hand touched me on my right shoulder. And the voice spoke to me and said, Mel, you have a deal. You don't take a drink and I will keep you sober. The first and last time that I ever heard an audible voice from God. I've had been sober for a few days at that point. I wasn't hallucinating, so I know that this was true. God is so faithful. Within two minutes, a neighbor popped through the front door like she always did. And she found me back in the bedroom, sitting on the bed, crying. The first time I'd cried in 17 years. She said to me. Mel, what's wrong? And I said I don't ever want to drink again. And she said OH great, let's go call A.A. Some reason this woman had the number for Alcoholics Anonymous in North Sacramento, and she called the number and handed me the phone and said here you talked to. I did and they said that they would send somebody out and I said no, I don't need anybody to come out, I just need to know where the meeting is. Still being stubborn and I'm going to do this myself. I've just asked God, He just spoke to me and here I am already doing to do it on my own. So 3 three more days went by and then I went to a Friday night meeting. It happened to be a birthday night in North Sacramento group. They told their stories, what it used to be like what happened and what it's like now. I wasn't convinced that I was still an alcoholic. But after the meeting and their stories, I said I think I might be an alcoholic. They all laughed and said that I was in the right place, and I think there was three other new people that night, and it was a wonderful night. There was no place to sit. It was so full. I was standing and after the meeting, everybody came up to me and said how glad they were that I was there. I could also have what they had. I went to meetings every day for every day, seven days a week for about a whole vear in North Sacramento. I learned a lot about alcoholism and what it is, what it does and how sneaky it is on us. If I take the first drink, there's no hope for me

getting away from a drunk. I knew at the time that there was no slip for me, no trying it again. That God had given me His word that He would keep me sober if I didn't take a drink . That is what I needed to do and that's what I did do. I refused to take it. About 5 months into sobriety, there were other people there for their first six months. They were getting drunk and I got scared. I thought, am I next? Am I going to get drunk? And by that time, I got a sponsor. He was a Southern Baptist preacher that had lost his Ministry through alcohol. He said to me, Mel, you're not. You're just fine. You're only suffering a dry drunk. Your body is screaming for a drink and you can't hear it. The things that I learned in A.A. kept me sober, caused me to learn and caused me to believe that that God could and would, if he were sought and I was busy seeking Him. There was a bet on me at about nine months that I was going to get drunk because I was on Cloud 9 for the whole year after God got me sober. And I don't think that I would have made sobriety if I'd had to do it one day at a time. God took the desire all at once for a drink. and I have never had as desire for one since. I went through a divorce at the at six months in the program. It was a difficult time and I was out on my own. I had lots of A.A. people around still doing meetings every day. Enjoying my new life in Alcoholics Anonymous and talking about God, could and would if He were sought. God is always faithful if you will seek him. I got married again about a year later had two more children I tried to seek God with all my heart and he was found by me and I did a lot of A.A. work, did the speaker platform at some recovery houses out in Fallon I became more aware of God and his son, Jesus Christ, I returned to my faith that I had when I was at 14, proceeded to be involved with Jesus as my Lord and savior. My sponsor was very supportive. He told me that Alcoholics Anonymous was for salvation from alcohol and the church was for salvation for the soul, and told me not to mix them up. That was good advice and I took it. And from that point on, after 10 years, another divorce, which I hated. But it did happen. I'm so grateful for the whole relationship I have with God, as I understand Him. I'm not angry about my alcoholism, at the time I spent in the cup. Because if it wasn't for that, I wouldn't be who I am today and I like me and most people like me. When I came into A.A. all I wanted to do was be a

to be kind. That was something I wanted to be because I had not been a kind person for 17 years in the cup. I am a kind person today and I have some humility, except when I think about it. And then it seems to disappear. That I've been told that I have been humbled at times, so I have a total of 11 children. I have three of my five of my own. 2 Stepchildren 3 foster children and one that adopted me because she needed a father. And I'm very grateful for all that. And I have 17 grandchildren. And 31 great grandchildren and 1 great grandchild. And that's a life that's full.
